Points on Making the Babcock Milk Test.
Variations in the fat contents of normal milk run ordinarily from three percent to six percent of fat with sometimes greater extremes than these. Some principals of making the Babcock test are thus pointed out by the O. A. C. extension dairy specialists:

The milk should be thoroughly mixed by pouring from one can or bucket to another two or three times, and samples taken at once. It should be tested if possible within twelve hours from the time the milk was drawn from the cow.

The cream must be uniformly mixed with the milk, which can be accomplished by shaking or by pouring from one jar to another. If lumps of dry cream or butter appear they must be melted by setting the jar into warm water. If the sample is sour and contains lumps of curd these may be destroyed by adding a knife-point full of soda lye, shaking and let stand. After this treatment the sulphuric acid should be added in small quantities at a time, since the chemical action becomes violent. Both milk and acid should be 55 to 70 degrees F. when the test is made.
