**Delicious Lemon Pudding**—The juice and grated rind of one lemon, one cupful of sugar, the yolk of two eggs, three well-rounded tablespoonfuls flour, one pint of milk. Mix the flour and part of the milk to a smooth paste, add

the lemon, sugar, yolk of eggs well beaten and the rest of the milk. Line baking dish with rich pastry rolled about one-quarter inch thick. Bake in good oven. Beat whites to a stiff froth, add two tablespoonfuls of sugar, spread over the top, return to the oven to brown. Serve cold.

One way to assist in the reduction of the high cost of living is to buy 100 cakes of soap at a time. Soap lasts longer, as you know, the older it is, and besides, the cost of the soap will be reduced by buying 100 cakes at a time.
