FADS AND FANCIES

To make linen centers for crocheted dollies, mark the linen with a pencil, using a round plate or saucer for a guide. Then stitch on the sewing machine two or three times, following the pencil line and placing the stitching one over the other. Cut away the cloth leaving an edge about one-sixteenth of an inch wide. This makes a corded edge over which to work the crochet, and does away with the old tedious method of hemming.

I have pressed many hundreds of suits, as it was my business for fifteen years. Not one was shiny when it left my hands, writes a contributor to the Tacoma Tribune. This is how it is done by all high-class tailors:

Lay the article smoothly on the ironing board. Place over it a piece of cloth that has no lint or fuzz upon it. Lay this on dry. Have a basin of water handy. Use a sponge or soft brush with a handle, dip in the water and rub over the cloth. Now iron. If, upon lifting the cloth, you find any shine, put the cloth on again, wet, and iron again, taking off the cloth this time before it is dry, and there will be no shine.

Pressing too dry will leave the shine, so be sure to take off the cloth while still damp.

Never press wool goods of any kind on the right side without the damp cloth.

TESTED RECIPES

Candied Sweet Potatoes—Wash, pare and parboil four good-sized sweet potatoes; drain, cut into lengthwise slices about half an inch thick, and put in a buttered baking dish. Spread thickly

with a syrup made from one-fourth cup of butter, one-half cup of brown sugar, and one-fourth cup of hot water. Bake while baking.

Nut Snaps—To make nut snaps, cream together half a cupful of butter with one cupful of granulated sugar. Then add two well-beaten eggs, a teaspoonful of vanilla extract, one cupful of chopped nut meats and a teaspoonful of baking powder, sifted with sufficient flour to form a dough that can be handled. Roll out on the pastry board as thin as possible, cut into any desired shape, arrange on a greased baking sheet and cook in a quick oven.

Chicken Hollandaise—Cook three tablespoonsful butter with one teaspoonful finely chopped onion until yellow. Add two tablespoonsful flour, and pour in gradually one and a half cups chicken stock. Stir until the mixture thickens, then add one-half tablespoonful lemon juice, three-fourths teaspoonful salt, one-eighth teaspoonful paprika, one-half cupful chopped celery, one and one-half cups cooked chicken (cut into cubes), two tablespoonsful pimiento, cut fine. When boiling, add the beaten yolk of two eggs and cook one minute. Serve on buttered graham toast.

What the Grange Is Doing and Saying.
One thing the grange has been doing for the last several weeks, extending now into months, has been the stirring up of a special interest in the problem of good roads.

It did not require much effort to arouse this interest. Everyone is awaking to the almost supreme importance of this problem and the necessity of finding the best possible solution of it. Providence has endowed western Oregon with three natural resources of the first order. These three are her climate, her soil, her timber. The last of these she has been disposing of with lavish, not to say wasteful, prodigality, she having already parted with much of it without an adequate return. As to the second, her soil, she has also been too prodigal. She has been wasteful of its marvelous fertility by lack of crop-rotation and by the non-application of scientific methods of soil culture.

As to her wonderful climate, she cannot waste that. It is hers in fee simple. She cannot give it away, nor can others take it from her. But she can make it more productive to herself by making it more available to others. Here is where the supreme importance of good roads comes in. Great as are the attractions of her climate, they can only exercise those attractions to the full and receive their due appreciation

as they are supplemented by the best of good roads.

At a time of abominably bad roads two men met. Said A to B, "These roads are something terrible." Said B to A, glancing upward, "Yes, but it is a mighty fine day over head." "Yes," answered A dubiously, glancing up and then down, "but there don't seem to be many people going that way." A man may walk with his head in the clouds, but he walks with his feet on the earth. It is our business to make our climate as comfortable under foot as it is delightful over head. This is just what we are now proposing to do, only stopping to inquire what is the best and most satisfactory way of doing it.

Another thing that the grange is proposing to do is to interest itself in bringing about a reform in our present system of supplying the schools of the state with their books. All are agreed that the time has come for the state to deliver itself from the coils of the schoolbook trust and the grip of the grafter. A committee has been appointed to present a resolution for discussion at our next lecture hour, which will be made to embody its sentiments on this subject. It is expected that the grange will go on record at that time in favor of the state furnishing all school books free of charge. All parents and teachers interested in this question are invited to be present at and take part in this discussion, which will occur at the lecture hour, 1:30, on Feb. 19.

Valley Clubs Organize

Albany, Ore., Feb. 5. — Cooperation in marketing, improving roads and unifying production, were included in the work contemplated by the Willamette Valley Development association which was launched here today by representatives of the Willamette valley commercial clubs.

Saturday, March 11, was set as the time for a second meeting to be held in this city, when the organization will be perfected. The county courts of the eight valley counties and representatives from all the commercial clubs will be invited to the meeting.

J. H. Robnett, Albany, and Otto H. Luck, Salem, were elected chairman and secretary of the temporary organization. J. B. Protzman and A. J. Armstrong of Cottage Grove represented that city at the meeting.

Eugene Cannery Increases Business
The volume of the canned goods business of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, an organization in which 541 Lane county farmers are stockholders, increased 25 per cent during the past year, according to the annual report of J. O. Holt, manager.

More extensive operations of the cannery owned by the association are planned for 1916, when departments for the manufacture of jams and jellies in both glass and tin will be added.

In detail the report shows that the total amount of fruit and vegetables handled in all departments was 2,360,000 pounds, an increase of 10 per cent. The varieties of products canned numbered thirty-seven.

Wants Receiver Dismissed

N. D. Hardy, former manager of the Smeed hotel, has filed answer to the case of Stephen Smeed, against N. D. Hardy, in which he denies many of the allegations made by the plaintiff, and asks that the receiver of the hotel be dismissed.

Mr. Hardy denies there was any contract between him and Mr. Smeed to the effect as alleged by Mr. Smeed. He says further he has an equity and interest in the hotel furniture and that he is suffering a loss by having a receiver appointed to conduct the hotel business.

A man who proved to be a fake and who had collected considerable money with the deaf and dumb stunt, was arrested at Eugene last week.

WOULD COST \$25 A FAMILY FOR PREPAREDNESS

In a recent elaborate article in the Eugene Register Co. Mercer presents figures to show that the preparedness campaign proposed by President Wilson will cost at the rate of \$25 for every family in the United States during the five year period set by the president, of \$25 a family for the five years. This would make the cost to Lane county alone \$844,575. The figures by civil divisions are as follows:

Ralph Wyant received severe injuries Saturday when he fell from a tie pile at the D. E. Baughman mill at London. His shoulder blade was fractured and his head received a severe bruise. He was unconscious for some time but is recovering nicely.

LIGHTNING RODS.

Why They End in a Sharp Point and Not in a Knob.

The reason a lightning rod has a sharp point is because a fine point offers no resistance to the discharge of electricity and in order that a cloud may be emptied of its noisily and harmlessly.

The degree of resistance is in proportion to the surface of the object. If the rod were surmounted by a knob, for instance, the discharge would be violent. But many a lightning rod has received an electrical discharge when the people in the building below were calmly unconscious of the fact. Non-corrosive metal is used for the point of the rod, as corrosion makes resistance.

The difference between a point and a ball is shown in discharging a battery. The full charge from a large battery would be received quietly on a metal point, while a moderate charge from a small one would explode violently on a ball.

It is said that a full charge may be passed harmlessly through a person's body if received on the point of a needle, whereas the same charge received on a discharger with a ball or knob on the end would mean instant death.—London Telegraph.

Its Many Remarkable Features That Make It Famous.

Strassburg, the capital of Alsace-Lorraine, is remarkable for the great clock of its cathedral.

This clock, which is twenty feet in height, was made by Jean Baptiste Schwilgue in 1842. Besides various astronomical devices indicating true solar time, it has a great planetarium in which the revolutions of the planets are represented, so that the relative positions of each at any time can be seen at a glance.

Then on a platform above are movable figures representing the four ages of man. At the first quarter of an hour a child strikes the bell with a rattle; a youth in the garb of a hunter strikes it with an arrow at the half hour; at the third quarter a warrior strikes it with his sword, and at the fourth quarter an old man strikes it with his crutch. Then a figure of Death appears and strikes the full hour with a fleshless bone.

On the highest platform is a natural sized figure of Christ, and when Death strikes the hour at noon the twelve apostles pass before the feet of their master, bowing as they do so. As Peter passes a large cock ruffled off on one side flaps his wings, puffs his neck and gives three times a loud and perfectly natural crow.—London Standard.

BRITISH REFUSED TO SAVE GERMANS

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville.—Comparisons with the Baralong case, in which British sailors refused quarter to drowning German seamen, according to official German statements, are drawn by German newspapers in discussing the missing Zeppelin L-19. The Overseas News Agency summarizes the case in this wise:

"German naval airship L-19 has not returned from a reconnoitering trip. A British news agency reports that the airship and her crew were seen drifting in the North sea by the English trawler King Stephen, from Grimsby, and that the airship crew, clinging to the parts above the water of the half-submerged craft, asked for rescue, which was refused by the British crew, the British sailors giving as a reason for their refusal that the German crew outnumbered them."

FISHING RIGHTS RESTRICTED

Court Says Treaty Does Not Exempt Indian From Law's Operation.

Olympia, Wash.—Through an interesting inquiry into the history of civilization's dominance over savagery, the state supreme court has denied the Indian's right to fish when and where he wished to because his fathers had done so from time immemorial.

The decision reverses the lower court and supports Commissioner L. H. Darwin's enforcement of restrictions against Indians taking spawning salmon with gaffs at a dam in the Yakima river.

The premise of Indian sovereignty in this respect is rejected entirely.

WHITMAN IS FOR HUGHES

New York Governor is Candidate for Re-election.

New York.—Governor Whitman reiterated his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor. His announcement was coupled with a denial that he had agreed to seek the nomination for second place at the republican national convention on a ticket to be headed by Theodore E. Burton, William E. Borah or Albert B. Cummins.

"I am for Justice Hughes for president. He would sweep the country," said Mr. Whitman.

Fifty-five Million Feet of Timber Sold

Corvallis, Or.—A transfer has been completed in Benton county whereby the Charles K. Spaulding interests became the owners of 55,000,000 feet of standing timber and a logging railroad running to the edge of the property.

By arrangement with the Southern Pacific company the logging company will ship logs to the two Spaulding lumber mills, one at Salem and the other at Newberg.
