SCHOOLS OF SOUTH LANE IN GOOD CONDITION

L. P. Harrington, State Field Worker, and Supervisor O'Reilly Visit Schools Here.

L. P. Harrington, state field worker for boys' and girls' industrial work, and School Supervisor A. L. O'Reilly have returned to Eugene after having spent a week visiting schools and conducting evening community rallies in this part of Lane county. On Tuesday evening they conducted a rally at Walker high school where Vesta Holt is teaching, and Saginaw where George Hall and Jessie Smith, both of Cottage Grove, are teachers. During the evening they held a rally at the Cedar school. This district was highly complimented by the speakers for the excellent condition of building and grounds. The supervisor declared it to be the best equipped and most sanitary one-room school he had ever been in. The school has earned all the requirements for a standard school and a big rally will be held there in the near future. Miss Cox of Cottage Grove is teaching in this school. The members of the board are, G. W. McFarland, Curtis Veatch and Mr. Tucker.

On Thursday they visited district No. 119, Eva Hopper, teacher; Dorena, where Prof. K. K. Robinson is principal and Mrs. England, Miss Vaughn and Miss Dean are assisting, and district No. 24, where Joe Smith and Mae Armstrong are teaching. During the evening they held a community rally at Hebron, where Jane Gilchrist is teaching.

On Friday they visited the Silk Creek school, where Leslie Godard is teaching. The visitors were greatly interested in the excellent work being done in this school and attractive appearance of the room. The supervisor stated that this is the most attractive school room he has in his district. This school has a well equipped manual training shop and the pupils are turning out some excellent pieces of work. During the afternoon they visited the Latham school, where Jessie McCord of Cottage Grove is teaching. Although Miss McCord has been here only a few days, she has the work well in hand. During the evening a rally was held at Dorena. This was the largest rally held. Dorena has an excellent high school which has met all the requirements of the state department. This district has a very active parent-teachers' association.

At each of the five meetings Mr. Harrington gave illustrated lectures on industrial work. Among the slides of particular interest were pictures of Oscar Schneider, Norman Pohle and Little Earl and Ruth Stewart of Cottage Grove, also Earl Stewart's garden exhibit, which was the best in the state last fall. Many pictures of Lane county schools were also shown, the River

Road school in Lane county being shown as a "model school" and the best in the state.

The supervisor reports the attendance and interest very good at each of the meetings and is planning for more in the near future.

3471 Voters in Lane County Registered.

An even 1,000 democrats have registered in Lane county, according to the official count made for the week ending January 29. The total number of republicans registered in the county up to that time was 2471. Only one bull mooser has registered, but there are 34 progressives.
