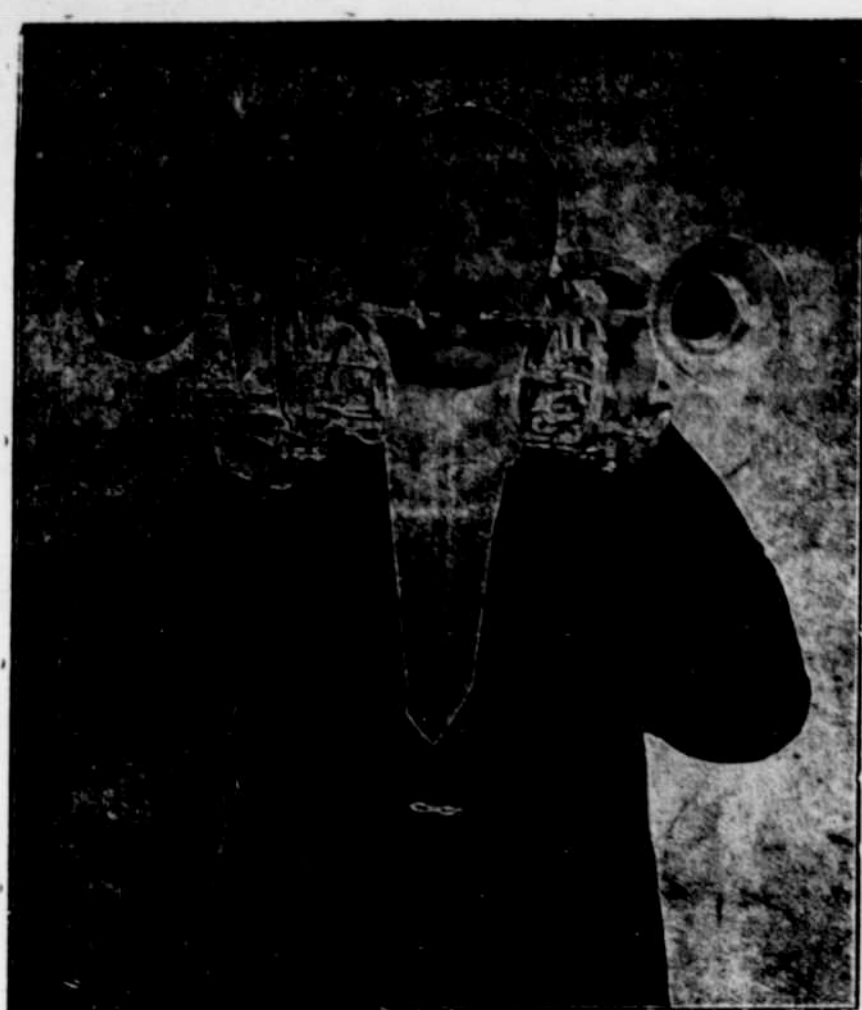




THE DeMOSS ENTERTAINERS ARE COMING

CONGRESS RESUMES LEGISLATIVE BUSINESS

Agitation to Warn Americans off Armed Merchantmen is Abandoned.

Washington.—Legislative business was resumed in regular order at the capitol this week after the recent flurry over international affairs that demoralized the work of congress. In both houses administration leaders have held in control the threatened revolt against the president on the armed ship issue, and no further outburst is expected unless there should be a development apparently leading toward war.

Leaders of the agitation for action to warn Americans off belligerent merchantmen carrying arms admit there is no chance to get legislation on the subject. Senator Gore, author of the warning resolution in the senate, has publicly declared that there is no desire to stay the hand of the president in diplomatic negotiations. He also says the real purpose of his resolution already had been accomplished, and this is regarded by administration leaders practically as an abandonment of the effort to force the issue in either house.

Armed Merchantmen as Warships.

Germany has instructed Count von Bernstorff to inform the United States government that the assurances regarding the future continuance of submarine warfare, given in the Lusitania and Arabic cases, still are binding, but that they apply only to merchantmen of a peaceful character.

The German government is understood to contend that armed merchantmen, without regard to the nature of their armament, have shown themselves not to be peaceful and therefore subject to destruction without warning.

The instructions direct the German ambassador particularly to tell Secretary Lansing that British merchantmen armed ostensibly only for defense have not assumed the character of peaceful traders, but on the contrary, they carry guns for the special purpose of attacking German submarines. To support this contention, the Berlin foreign office has sent the ambassador, for presentation to the state department, a list of at least 20 incidents where it is asserted British merchant ships have attacked submarines.

Water Power Fight Renewed.

Conservation champions in the senate plan to throw their combined strength against the Shields bill to provide for leasing of water power sites on navigable waters to private interests. For two weeks they have been fighting the bill in a more or less haphazard manner, but they propose this week to centralize their efforts in the hope of amending the measure to the satisfaction of the conservation forces. Senator Hastings, of Wisconsin, who has had co-operation of other senators, will propose a substitute to the Shields bill, with regulatory features which he declares will safeguard the public interest and prevent monopolization of water power facilities.

Senator Norris, of Nebraska, charged in the senate Saturday that the strongest lobby the capital has seen in many years is here in the interest of the Shields bill and that it is composed of representatives of the water power trust, "which has its headquarters in Wall street."

Aviation Inquiry Pressed.

As soon as an opportunity is offered Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, will make an effort to have passed his resolution providing for an inquiry into the aviation service of the army, against which he has filed serious charges of inefficiency.

Progress is being made on general appropriation bills, but leaders in both houses are complaining again over delay in legislative accomplishments and another speeding-up order has been sent out all along the line. The judiciary sub-committee of the senate hopes to conclude its hearing this week on the fitness of Louis D. Brandeis for the supreme court. Part of the time of the senate, it is expected, will be given to consideration of the treaty providing for the Haitian financial protectorate.

Consideration of the postoffice appropriation bill will be continued in the house and its disposition will see the appropriation bill taken up. The immigration bill debate has been postponed and it may not be reached before next week.

The house military committee voted for a regular standing army of 137,000 men, with a 2 per cent allowance for recruiting, bringing the number up to 140,000, which is slightly more than the war department asked. The republicans and three democrats carried the vote.

Durazzo Abandoned to Austrians.

Rome.—Abandonment of the Albanian city of Durazzo to the Austrians was officially announced here.
