Joe Miller Dies Following Lingering Illness.

Joseph M. Miller, for 23 years a resident of Cottage Grove, died at 3 o'clock this morning after a lingering illness with a complication of diseases. Mr. Miller was born April 20, 1848, at Evans Mills, Jefferson county, N. Y. He was married in 1874 to Ida M. Smith, who survives. He served in the Twentieth New York cavalry for three years. Mr. and Mrs. Miller have conducted a boarding house here for a number of years. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock Thursday from the Mills chapel, Rev. D. A. McLeod officiating.
