MUCH TRAVELLED HORSE IS DEAD OF OLD AGE

Vic was driven from Ohio to California over 20 years ago by Mr. Ribble, then to Wyoming, and then back to California and then to Oregon about 16 years ago. Mr. Foster bought the mare from Mrs. Ribble about seven years ago, after the death of Mr. Ribble. She never had but two owners. She was about 30 years of age.

Two Men Have Narrow Escape.

J. H. Gillmore and Thompson Morse narrowly escaped death at Creswell Saturday afternoon when the roof of the former's blacksmith shop on the Pacific highway gave away under the weight of the snow. The entire roof caved in and in falling pushed the sides of the building outward. Mr. Gillmore was busily engaged in the woodworking department and when the crash came did not have sufficient time to get to either the front or side door of the building. He crouched under some wagon wheels and other wagon material close by and in doing so undoubtedly saved his life. Mr. Morse was nearer the door but was unable to gain the entrance so he crouched under the forge.

Garden and Orchard Hints

March 1 to 15.
Use a wide board to stand on when it is necessary to get on wet cultivated soil for tree lifting or pruning. If the soil is trodden into a pasty condition it will work badly all summer.
Keep on with all preparation for the planting season, which may be very short this year.

Tread the lower soil when planting flowers or shrubs but always leave the upper two inches loose.
It is unwise to remove rhubarb roots too early. Let them get a little active first and then look after them well by a mulch afterward.

Push on with preparation of the soil where grass seed is to be sown next month.
It is better to head newly planted trees too hard than to leave too much straggling growth.

Allow winter protected plants time to harden well before planting out. Nothing is gained by haste.

It is rather early yet to start dahlias. Look over the roots of these and gladioli, and remove any showing signs of decay.

If you intend planting any shrubbery this season it should be done now. Mrs. J. Laing is one of the best hybrid perpetual roses for late and continuous flowering.

Never attempt any soil preparation when it is so wet it clings to the boots. This is bad policy with light soils and ruinous with those of a heavy texture. Pea and bean seeds soaked in kerosene for about 20 minutes are not injured and mice and moles will not eat them so readily when treated this way.

Injunction Dissolved.

The preliminary injunction issued a few days ago by Judge Skipworth, of the circuit court, restraining the sheriff from collecting the 2.79 mill road tax against property in Eugene, Cottage Grove and Springfield, was dissolved by the judge and the case will be finally decided some time next week, he announced.

Judge Skipworth explained in court at the time of his decision to dissolve the preliminary injunction that he was not passing upon the merits of the case at this time.

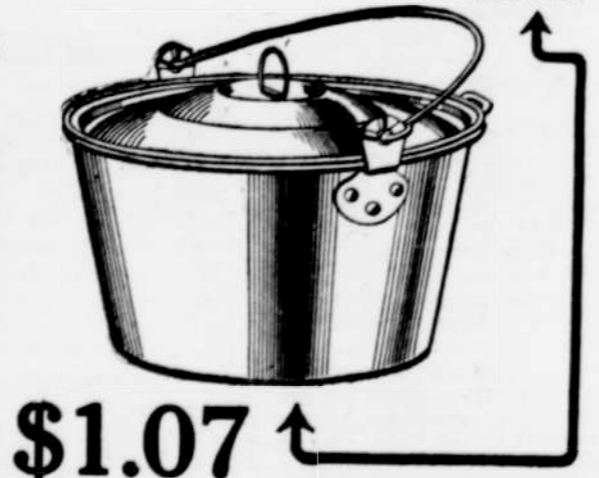
