FEBRUARY WARM MONTH

Highest Temperature Was 70, Mean Temperature Was 45.6.

The warmest February day since 1902 occurred last month, when the temperature rose to 70 degrees.

There were 3.2 inches of snow last month, while none was recorded in February, 1915. There were seven clear days, eight partly cloudy and 14 cloudy. Killing frosts occurred on the 12th, 18th, 25th and 27th, but no damage was reported, it being too early.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 53.9; mean minimum, 37.2, making a mean temperature of 45.6 degrees. This is 2.9 degrees above the average for the month. The maximum temperature was 70, and the minimum, 28.

The rainfall for the month was 5.42 inches, .90 above the average, and two inches more than February last year.

March so far has been acting very much like a lion and is, therefore, expected to go out like a lamb.
