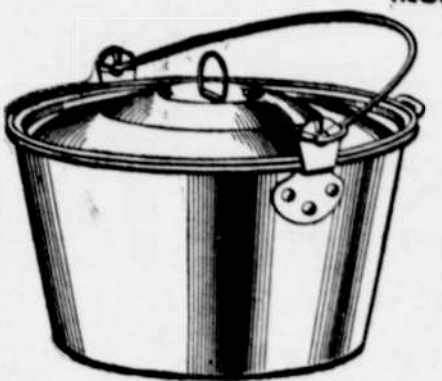

PADS AND FANCIES.

Prunes cooked in the oven after soaking over night, seasoned and sweetened to taste, are much richer than if stewed.

Bacon rinds are good boiled with cabbage, string or soup beans.

Air blowing on bread sponge will keep it from rising, and may spoil it entirely.

A little grape juice, beaten egg white added to lemonade, forms a delicious and healthful drink.

If eggs are boiled in salted water the shells will peel easily.

A generous pinch of salt added to flour for thickening, before mixing with water, tends to keep it from being lumpy.

When roasting a fowl, stuff the breast with pared and cut up sweet potatoes; the flavor is surprising.

Vegetables to be cooked by boiling should be put into boiling water, as little as possible, and if the water is added let it be boiling hot. Steaming is best for most vegetables.

If too much flour is used in mixing a cake it will crack open on top in baking. When this occurs it is safe to omit half a cup next time.

As is well known, a paper pattern for a dress consists of many pieces—the waist pattern proper, the pieces for the sleeves, the girdle, the skirt portions, etc. It frequently happens that only certain of these portions are used; when a sleeve is to be made over a waist is to be made. It is therefore plain that much time is wasted in hunting over the many pieces of the pattern to find the particular piece desired. Accordingly whenever I buy a paper pattern I separate the various pieces, fold them carefully and slip them into long envelopes. I label these envelopes properly and tie them together, and when I want a certain piece of the pattern it is but the work of a moment to get it.

MAN AND WIFE ARE SHOT FROM AMBUSH

Grants Pass, Or.—Luther B. Akers and his wife, Mrs. Elsie Akers, and their team of two horses were all shot and killed near Wildersville, 12 miles from here, by a neighbor farmer, Marshall D. Bousman, 63 years old. The slayer was lodged in jail here and confessed to the shooting.

Bousman lay in ambush by the roadside as the Akers couple were driving to Sunday school. Without warning he fired seven shots from a carbine. He then returned home, where he was later taken into custody.

Bousman had taken laudanum in an effort to commit suicide, but the drug had only made him sick.

The shooting is the culmination of a neighbors' quarrel over boundary fences, hogs at large and similar matters, of several years' duration. The trouble was not considered serious.

VERDUN SLAUGHTER GREAT

Terrible Plight of 30,000 Dying on the French Battle Line.

Paris.—The Verdun woods may go down in history as the world's bloodiest battlefield.

Trainloads of wounded, shattered men are reaching here, giving evidence of fearful carnage north of Verdun. Other trains are steaming eastward with reinforcements and munitions to fill the gaps made by the German offensive.

"There must be 30,000 wounded men dying in awful agony in the rain and snow, simply because their comrades cannot reach them," said a surgeon. "The percentage of dead will exceed that of the Champagne offensive last September because in this battle there is no lull, and no chance to withdraw the wounded under fire."

Thousands of dead and wounded men lay in the open on the plain north of Pepper Heights, under a hurricane of shells. Other thousands are among the stumps of Caures forest, the wounded in a living death, the dead left to rot, while the killing continues.

German Editors Confer.

Chicago.—Fifty editors and publishers of the leading German newspapers of the United States met behind closed doors here.

The editors decided not to make public the purpose of the meeting nor to divulge the proceedings. In political circles it was reported that the coming presidential campaign was under discussion.

New York.—Fifty-five and a half million dollars was the net profit in 1915 of the Du Pont Powder company as compared with \$4,500,000 net profit in 1914, according to the company's official statement here.

No doubt I have overlooked some of them, for, as before stated, my memory is somewhat dull.

At the time I became a member, for a country lodge, I believe this was comparatively strong in numbers, though I am not certain as to how many. I think about 35 to 40, but the membership was so badly scattered we rarely had enough to fill the offices at ordinary meetings and no work for several years.

The first Masonic funeral in which I ever took part as a Mason was that of Brother Yancey, grandfather of Brother H. B. Yancey.

For a number of years we had a mighty hard time. There was even talk at times of surrendering our charter, but there were a faithful few of us who continued steadfast in the faith and as new people began to settle in and around Cottage Grove, a new growth for the lodge began, having a fair degree of prosperity at about the time of Brother Geo. Wall's first term as worshipful master, which has continued to the present.

Now, brethren, you will have hard times and your blue spells and will sometimes have troubles which seem almost unsurmountable, but I do not think it possible for you to be compelled to pass through such times as we experienced in the early days, so don't give up; stand fast, for the clouds will surely roll away, and as time goes on, you will look back with a smile and wonder why it was that at the time your troubles loomed so dark in the foreground while in retrospect they appear only trivial.

Decrees Are Rendered.

Thomas K. Campbell yesterday obtained a decree against Rose Pearson and A. D. Pearson in the sum of \$500, together with eight per cent interest from June 27, 1912, \$60.88 as taxes paid by the plaintiff and \$75 attorney's fees, also an order for the sale of the mortgaged property.

Herbert Eakin was given a judgment against W. M. Watson in the sum of \$1048.91 and attorney fee of \$100.

The First National Bank of Cottage Grove was given a judgment against W. M. Watson and George W. McQueen in the sum of \$3905.50 and attorney fee of \$300.
