SELECTING SEED POTATOES

County Agriculturalist Gives Advice for Producing Tubers Free From Scab and Disease.

The time for planting early potatoes is so near at hand and the loss from using diseased seed is often so great, that attention is being called to some of the most common potato diseases and to the remedies for them.

It is impossible to grow a clean crop from diseased seed, so every precaution should be taken to see that only disease-free seed is planted. Some of the potato diseases live over from year to year in the soil and if they are introduced with the seed, the soil becomes diseased and a clean crop of potatoes cannot be produced on it for a number of years.

When a soil becomes infected with scab, fusarium wilt and dry rot or rhizoctonia, it is necessary that a crop rotation be used in which potatoes are not again grown on the infected soil for a term of from three to six years. Such a rotation will usually free the soil from the disease, but in some cases a longer time may be required.

In selecting potatoes for seed, it is better to use only those grown in a field free from disease. If this is impossible, as is frequently the case, then all potatoes that show decay or that show discolorations when cut should be discarded. Small potatoes that are not normally cut, if planted, should have a slice clipped from the stem end so any disease discolorations within the potato may be seen, if present. Brown or black discolorations within the potato usually indicate fusarium wilt or blackleg. These two diseases cannot be remedied by seed treatment, so it is necessary that extreme care be used in seed selection.

Scab may be eradicated by soaking the potatoes for two hours in a solution of one pint of 40 per cent formaldehyde in thirty gallons of water, or by soaking for one and one-half hours in a solution of four ounces of corrosive sublimate in thirty gallons of water. Neutral or alkaline soils are known to favor scab, so lime, wood ashes or fresh stable manure should not be put on soil that is to be planted to potatoes, if scab is at all feared.

Rhizoctonia may also be prevented by seed treatment. This disease is detected by the presence of small, dark,

warty bodies in the surface of the potato that look very much like particles of dirt when first noticed, but they do not come off very easily. Treat with the corrosive sublimate as given above, since the formalin treatment has not always been successful in handling this disease. In case of scab and rhizoctonia both, treat with the corrosive sublimate.

Late blight affects both the tubers and the vines. Select seed free from blight, and spray the plants with Bordeaux, keeping the tops covered with the spray from the time blossoming begins until the crop is mature. This will usually require at least two or three applications.

All seed selected from diseased stock should be given the corrosive sublimate treatment to kill any spores that may adhere to the surface from contact with diseased potatoes. Corrosive sublimate is a very dangerous poison, so care should be used in handling it.
