Resolution Favoring Printing of Text Books.
The following is the complete resolution recently adopted by Cottage Grove Grange:
Whereas, our free schools are not only our nation's pride and glory, but also the foundation upon which all our free institutions depend for their stability and security, and
Whereas, in order to be completely free, our schools must provide, not only free instruction, but free text books, as the medium through which that free instruction may be made available without distinction of class or condition, and
Whereas, the present policy of permitting school boards to loan text books to those pupils whose parents confess themselves unable to provide them, does tend to foster such distinctions, by causing such pupils to appear in the role "charity scholars," thus entailing humiliation to both parents and children, and
Whereas, this duty of making our free schools completely free, is one of such importance that it becomes an obligation on the entire state and can not be safely and wisely left to the option of the school districts themselves, many of which may not be financially able to assume such obligations;
Therefore, be it resolved, that we, the members of Cottage Grove Grange, No. 443, wish to go on record as favoring the proposition that the state shall furnish free text books to all its schools, to the end that these schools may be free in fact and name, and may offer their privileges to all, without distinction or condition, and inasmuch as we believe that the state can most economically apply this policy by publishing its own text books,
Therefore, be it resolved, second, that we believe that the state should assume the entire responsibility of providing text books for all its free schools by printing, instead of by purchase from outside publishers, who are often too ready to manipulate these matters to their own advantages instead of in the interests of the schools;
Therefore, be it resolved, third, that we invite all other granges of the state to unite with us in the effort to bring about this change of policy.
