### THREE STABBED IN BATTLE AT TURNER

Members of Band and City  
 Council Indulge in Fight  
 on Street.

Salem, Or.—In a pitched battle on  
 the streets of Turner Saturday  
 between members of the Turner band  
 and members of the city council, as-  
 sisted by partisans of each faction,  
 three men were stabbed, one probably  
 fatally.

With a charge of assault with a dan-  
 gerous weapon against him, Lee Jeans,  
 city councilman, of Turner, was taken  
 to the Marion county jail.

Jeans was released from custody af-  
 ter members of the Turner council had  
 deposited \$500 bonds to insure his  
 appearance when wanted.

With the town of Turner divided  
 into two factions for the last two  
 years as the result of a bitter contro-  
 versy over the installation of a city  
 water system, the clash is declared  
 to be merely the culmination of the  
 feud which has been growing more  
 tense ever since the faction known as  
 the "wets" won in the courts over  
 the "drys."

The battle, resulting in three men  
 being dangerously stabbed and at  
 least 30 others sustaining severe cuts  
 or bruises, arose during a perform-  
 ance of the Browning Carnival com-  
 pany, of Salem, which had been se-  
 cured by the Turner band to give a  
 benefit entertainment. The band as-  
 sisted in the carnival, which was stop-  
 ped by the city marshal on order of  
 the city council, because Browning had  
 not paid the \$3 city license which is  
 required of traveling show troupes.

### VILLA REPORTED TO HAVE DISAPPEARED

El Paso, Tex.—Francisco Villa has  
 again become the man of mystery.  
 Almost within the grasp of the Ameri-  
 can cavalry after the battle of Guer-  
 rero, the bandit is reported to have  
 slipped from the net closing about him  
 and to have covered the trail of his  
 flight. Mexican officials in Juarez  
 sought information of the brigand's  
 whereabouts, but got no definite word.

The mountains of Guerrero are be-  
 ing combed thoroughly for Villa by  
 the American forces, but nothing has  
 been learned as to his whereabouts  
 other than that captured bandits said  
 he was being carried farther into the  
 mountains in his jolting coach.

Villa's loss in dead in the battle  
 with Americans at Guerrero was  
 placed at 60 by General Pershing in  
 a report to General Funston. The  
 bodies were found in houses in Guer-  
 rero and scattered in the underbrush  
 for miles along the routes taken by  
 the fleeing Mexicans.

### VILLA ROUTED BY TROOPERS

Cavalrymen March 55 Miles in 17  
 Hours, Take Camp by Surprise.

El Paso.—Four hundred American  
 cavalrymen, under the command of  
 Colonel George A. Dodd, whirling down  
 from the granite slopes of the great  
 continental divide, fell like a thunder-  
 bolt on the main body of Francisco  
 Villa's bandits at the San Geronimo  
 ranch, scattering them like chaff in  
 the wind and driving the bandit chief,  
 wounded and crippled, to seek a hid-  
 ing place in the mountains.

The battle opened at 6 o'clock in  
 the morning of March 29. For 17  
 hours the veteran Colonel Dodd and  
 his picked riders of the Seventh and  
 Tenth Cavalry drove down the valley  
 of the Santa Maria river. At the end  
 of a 55-mile ride they burst upon the  
 unsuspecting camp where 500 bandits  
 were celebrating the massacre of 172  
 Carranza soldiers two days previously  
 at Guerrero.

Villa, shot through the leg and with  
 one hip shattered, was hurried from  
 the scene barely in time to escape.

Fugitive in \$100,000 Theft Caught.  
 Seattle, Wash.—Oliver H. Cline,  
 fugitive cashier of the Pacific Coast  
 company, wanted in Seattle to answer  
 the charge that he embezzled more  
 than \$100,000 of the company's funds,  
 was arrested after a three weeks'  
 search, which has covered the whole  
 country. His wife was with him.  
 Search of his pockets revealed \$8360.

Idaho Ex-Official is Sentenced.  
 Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.—Charles E.  
 Acton, ex-assessor and tax collector  
 of Kootenai county pleaded guilty to a  
 charge of misappropriation of county  
 funds. He was sentenced to serve  
 from two to 10 years in the peniten-  
 tary.
