REAL PREPAREDNESS CONTEST IS AT HAND

Big Fight Will Be Whether
Federal Reserve Shall Be
Added for Defense.

Washington.—The real contest over
the sort of preparedness this nation
is to have will be fought this week.
With the essential features of the sen-
ate bill determined, Chairman Cham-
berlain and his aides will draw the
lines of battle for the conference with
the house, where the final provisions
of the preparedness measure are to be
framed.

The last preparation was made when
the senate gave unanimous consent to
vote on the bill April 13. Its passage,
both friends and opponents admit, is
assured by a bi-partisan vote.

The conferees, who will decide the
terms of the measure to report back
to both houses, will be: Chamberlain,
Hitchcock and Dupont from the sen-
ate, and Hay, Dent and Kahn from the
house.

The big fight will be on whether
"federal reserve" shall be added to
the national guard as a factor in the
second line defense. Hay and Cham-
berlain are equally determined in their
positions.

Volunteer Army is Retained by Senate
The senate retained the federal vol-
unteer provision in the army bill by
a vote of 36 to 34, rejecting Senator
Lee's amendment to strike the section
out of the bill.

Advocate of the national guard as
the first line of defense behind the
regular army supported the amend-
ment vigorously and the struggle was
one of the hardest fought in the sen-
ate at this session of congress.

Without republican support, the vol-
unteer section would have been voted
out by the democratic senators, de-
spite the fact that it was unanimously
recommended by the military commit-
tee. Twenty-four democrats and 10
republicans, including nearly all the
progressive republicans, voted to
strike it out. Nineteen democrats and
17 republicans voted to retain it.

Carranza Will Ask Length of Stay.
State department dispatches indi-
cate that officials of the Mexican de-
facto government are viewing with
some anxiety the continued presence
of American troops in Mexico. One
dispatch authoritatively was described
as containing a hint that certain Mexi-
can officials believed the purpose of
the American punitive expedition had
been accomplished. This belief was
said to be based upon the assumption
that the bandits under Villa have been
dispersed.

Consul General Rodgers, it was
learned, has advised the department
that the de facto government officials
at Queretaro had intimated to him
they would like to know how long the
United States intended to keep the
troops in Mexico.

Fight for Bigger Navy Under Way.

The house naval sub-committee on
appropriations will begin work this
week on framing the naval appropria-
tion bill, which includes the adminis-
tration's half-billion dollar five-year
program for new fighting ships. Chair-
man Padgett hopes to lay the complete
measure before the house by April 25.
While there are many features in
the bill which will require debate in
the subcommittee and later before the
full committee, the big fight is ex-
pected to come over the 1917 program
for ships.

Secretary Daniels has recommended
the authorization of two dreadnoughts
and two battle cruisers. The navy
board contended for three dread-
noughts and three battle cruisers.
Indications are that the sub-commit-
tee will compromise and recommend
two battleships and four battle cruis-
ers.

Philippine Bill Recommended.
Passage of the Philippine independ-
ence bill was recommended to the
house by the insular committee just
as passed by the senate, including the
Clarke amendment to withdraw sov-
ereignty within four years and empow-
ering the president to take steps to
institute a free and independent gov-
ernment.

Bandit Chief Day Ahead.
El Paso, Tex.—In his flight before
the American cavalry, Francisco Villa
is believed to have passed Parral, and
with his band, said to number over
200 men, is reported to be heading for
Durango City. Detachments of the 15th
cavalry are hard on the bandit's trail.

Six More English Steamers Are Sunk.
London, April 16.—The sinking of
six more British steamers has been
reported. All of them were unarmed.
Three men are missing from the Silke-
worth Hall, 4777 tons gross. The
crews of the other vessels were saved.

Wisconsin Majority for La Follette.
Milwaukee, Wis.—Complete returns
of the result of the primary shows
that La Follette will be represented by
16 of the 24 delegates from Wisconsin
at the republican national convention.
