### Oregon Flag Law.

Section 2091. United States Flag,  
Desecration of, Prohibited.—Any person  
who in any manner, for exhibition or  
display, shall place or cause to be placed  
any words, or figures, or numbers, or  
marks, or inscriptions, or pictures, or  
designs, or device, or symbol, or token,  
or notice, or drawing, or any advertise-  
ment, of any nature whatever, upon any  
flag, standard, color, or ensign of the  
United States, or shall expose or cause  
to be exposed to public view any such  
flag, standard, color, or ensign of the  
United States, upon which shall be  
printed, painted or otherwise placed, or  
to which shall be attached, appended,  
affixed, or annexed, any words, or fig-  
ures, or numbers, or marks, or inscrip-  
tions, or pictures, or designs, or device,  
or symbol or token, or notice, or draw-  
ing or any advertisement, of any nature  
or kind whatever, or who shall expose  
to public view, or shall manufacture, or  
sell, or expose for sale, or have in pos-  
session for sale, or for use, any article,  
or thing, or substance, being an article  
for merchandise, or receptacle of mer-  
chandise, upon which shall have been  
printed, painted, or attached, or other-  
wise placed, a representation of any  
such flag, standard, color, or ensign of  
the United States, to advertise, or call  
attention to, or to mark, or to orna-  
ment, or to mark, or to distinguish the  
article or thing, on which so placed, or  
publicly deface, or defile, or defile, or  
cast contempt, either by words or act,  
upon any such flag, standard, color, or  
ensign of the United States, shall be  
deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and  
subject to a fine of not less than twenty  
dollars (\$20.00) nor more than one hun-  
dred dollars (\$100.00). (L. 1901, page  
286, Section 1, Oregon Laws.)

## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past  
Week Briefly Compiled for  
Our Readers.

Lebanon will celebrate "Cleanup  
Day" Thursday, April 27.

The hotel men of the state convened  
at Eugene April 19 and 20.

The East Umatilla County track  
meet was held at Umatilla.

Some 2,000,000 pounds of wool have  
been contracted for in eastern Oregon.

Fire destroyed the sub-station of the  
Drain electric light plant with \$1000  
loss.

The organization of a chamber of  
commerce in The Dalles has been per-  
fected.

The Marion county enrollment in  
industrial club work totals 1000 boys  
and girls.

John G. Lanterman, 69 years old,  
pioneer of the southern Oregon coun-  
try, died at Grants Pass.

Clatskanie has decided to rent out  
its city jail, which has not been occu-  
pied for more than a year.

July 7 has been set as the date for  
the opening of Albany's annual Chan-  
taqua assembly this year.

The senate has confirmed the nomi-  
nation of Andrew J. Foster as receiver  
of the Lakeview land office.

The Umatilla County Good Roads  
association has announced a prize es-  
say contest by school children.

The Coos Bay Auto Racing club will  
open its 1916 season April 29, with a  
race meeting on the Marshfield track.

J. M. Upton, register of the Rose-  
burg land office since February, 1914,  
died in the Roseburg hospital after a  
brief illness.

Josephine county mineralogists are  
speculating upon the possibility of  
commercial mining of chromite or  
chromic iron ore.

Business over the Willamette-Pac-  
ific railroad, over which passenger traf-  
fic was inaugurated April 5, has far  
exceeded expectations.

The fourth annual convention of the  
Pacific coast division of the Religious  
Education association will be held in  
Portland May 10 and 11.

For the week ending April 20, a total  
of 237 accidents were reported to the  
state industrial accident insurance  
commission, of which three were fatal.

Rabbits that have been a menace to  
the farmers near North Powder for  
several years have been exterminated.  
Big drives, poisoned food and heavy  
snow did the work.

A million fingerling salmon and  
about 400,000 eastern brook trout will  
be liberated from the state fish hatch-  
ery on the upper McKenzie river east  
of Eugene, this summer.

A party of upper-classmen from the  
school of forestry of the Oregon Agri-  
cultural college made a trip of inspec-  
tion to the mills and manufacturing  
plants in and about Portland.

In fees paid by candidates for filling  
their declarations of candidacy and for  
space in the official election cam-  
paign pamphlet, the state of Oregon  
this year received a total of \$6350.

To curtail the number of drunks in  
Pendleton and to enforce the prohibi-  
tion laws the purchasers and amount  
of liquor sold each month by each of  
the drug stores will be published.

Machinery is on the way from San  
Francisco to Alkali lake, near Paisley,  
where the American Soda Products  
company, backed by the Spreckels in-  
terests, is developing the soda beds.

Efforts to induce every county in  
Oregon to place exhibits at the Oregon  
state fair to be held in Salem Sep-  
tember 25-30, are being made by A.  
H. Lea, secretary of the state fair  
board.

On the recommendation of President  
Kerr the Oregon Agricultural college  
board of regents at its annual meeting  
cut \$30,000 from the totals recom-  
mended by the heads of the depart-  
ments.

The Pythian Sisters, the auxiliary to  
the Knights of Pythias, will hold its  
supreme temple session in Portland  
from August 1 to August 10, at the  
same time that the supreme lodge,  
Knights of Pythias, will meet.

Arrangements were completed at a  
meeting at Albany for a preliminary  
survey of Linn county's first farm  
drainage project. The land it is pro-  
posed to drain lies along Oak creek  
and embraces about 18,000 acres.

The registration in Oregon for the  
primary election to be held May 19  
is believed to be approximately 235,  
000. This estimate is based on infor-  
mation from counties which have not  
yet reported the full registration.

Resolutions against the construction  
of a steel bridge over the Willamette  
river at Salem were adopted at a mass  
meeting of the citizens of Fork coun-  
ty. The construction of a high level  
concrete bridge was in great favor.

Initiation of a proposed constitu-  
tional amendment limiting increase in  
taxation for state and municipality is to  
be the first step in the program of the  
State Taxpayers' League of Oregon  
formed in Portland as the result of a  
statewide conference called to discuss  
the problem of taxation in Oregon.
