### SOUTHERN PACIFIC WOULD BUY NEW EQUIPMENT

Authorizations Call for Outlay of Seven Millions to Build Engines and Boxcars.

San Francisco, April 5.—Authorizations to spend about \$7,000,000 for equipment were asked of the state railroad commission today by the Southern Pacific company and the Western Pacific road. The Southern Pacific would issue equipment trust certificates for \$6,015,138, and the Western Pacific purposes an expenditure of \$372,170 in cash and \$600,000 in deferred payments. Both petitioners gave as reasons for the outlay the deterioration from use of the present equipment and increased traffic demands. The new equipment for the Southern Pacific would be for its lines in California and to New Orleans.

The new equipment desired by the Southern Pacific includes 20 passenger engines, 1788 fifty-ton single sheathed box cars and 600 automobile cars.

#### Honest Debts.

#### Torrens Plan Foes Called Selfish.

The Torrens system of registering land titles is the right and logical system; titles so registered are safer than titles merely recorded; the present unpopularity of the Torrens system is not due to any weakness in it, but to a selfish and misleading campaign that has been waged by attorneys and abstract companies who didn't want the business simplified and cheapened: all this on the word of Eugene lawyers who engaged in a lively discussion of Oregon land titles at the monthly meeting of the Round Table.

The discussion grew out of a paper on "The Title to Our Lands," read by

Allbee E. Wheeler. Mr. Wheeler announced that E. O. Immel would lead the discussion but John M. Williams and Judge E. O. Potter plunged in and criticized the interests that had been delaying the general adoption in Oregon of what they said was the cheaper and better system.

Mr. Wheeler, however, predicted that the change was bound to come, as abstracts grow more complicated with time. When he began business in Eugene, he said, abstracts averaged four or five pages and cost on the average about \$6. Now property has changed hands so many times that they run about fifty pages and cost from \$30 up.

#### Newberg Cannery Sold.

Newberg, Ore., April 20.—A deal whereby the growers of fruit and vegetables of this district expect to reap much advantage was negotiated today in the sale of the Newberg cannery to A. Rupert & Company of Portland and J. W. Chambers of Newberg for \$14,410.

The Newberg cannery association, the seller, has been a co-operative company for years and includes 350 stockholders none of whom will get any money from the sale of the plant. The \$14,410 is all to go to pay the debts of the association which has been in the hands of a trustee for some time following disagreements among the stockholders. The stockholders had paid in \$8,800 in cash for the plant but are apparently glad to be able to let go now.

The new owners, it is said, will pay cash for fruit and vegetables. Heretofore the growers, who were also the stockholders, had been compelled to wait until the canned product was marketed before getting their money and some years the return has been only 60 per cent of the open market price.

#### Putting It Over on Printers.

The big jump in the price of printing material is a serious question with most printers and publishers just now, for there is a jump of 50 per cent on some materials of paper. We do not say that the jobbing houses are putting one over on the printers, but we are inclined to think that the war is made a pretext to raise the price of most everything that can be raised, or in other words, it is a general "graft" system to fleece people to pay more. This is going to paralyze the printing business. In point of illustration, some bond papers have nearly doubled in price and inks have likewise taken a jump. One pound of blue ink that used to cost us \$1.00 now costs \$4.00 and is liable to go to \$8.00. Black job ink that used to cost us from \$1.50 to \$2.00 a pound has jumped to \$5.00 a pound. Every week there is an advance in the price of newspaper, and nobody appears to know how high this will go in the next few months.—Tillamook Headlight.

#### Soon Time to Spray.

As soon as three-fourths of the petals of the apple blossoms have fallen it is time to spray apple trees for codling moth. C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, says that for the first spray for the moth use the lime-sulphur solution at the rate of one gallon to 35 or 40 gallons of water, plus four pounds of the paste arsenate of lead or two pounds of the dry arsenate of lead to each 100 gallons. On pears the arsenate of lead can be omitted and used at the next spraying which should be ten days or two weeks later.

## TROOPS STAY UNTIL ORDER IS RESTORED

Carranza Must Show Ability to Rule Before Soldiers Will Be Recalled.

Washington.—Behind the formal announcement that President Wilson had approved a plan for redispatriation of the American troops in Mexico, there was a plain intimation that the Washington government had determined to maintain a military status quo beyond the border until the Mexican de facto government has demonstrated its ability to capture or crush Villa and his adherents and prevent repetitions of the Columbus raid.

Secretary Baker announced the approval of the re-disposition plan after consulting with the president over a joint report submitted by Major-General Funston and Major-General Scott, chief of staff, in conference on the border. The plan was proposed by General Funston and concurred in by General Scott.

The new military plan leaves the pursuit of Villa at a standstill, but frees General Funston's hands to make the position of the forces in Mexico secure by grouping them in posts of such strength as to protect them from attack. It will also serve as a plain warning to General Carranza that he must bend every effort toward securing complete control of the territory south of the most advanced American post if he hopes to have the troops recalled.

#### Berlin Surprised at Demands of Note.

The United States government has made tentative plans to cope with every conceivable situation which would result from the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany. For reasons they indicated were obvious, officials deemed it unwise to discuss the details.

Among the dispatches received from Ambassador Gerard within the past few days was one describing the manner in which the American note declaring the purpose of the United States to break relations unless Germany modified her submarine methods was received by German officials. While this, too, was held as confidential, it is understood the ambassador represented Berlin officials as being greatly surprised at the demands of the Washington government.

Mr. Gerard is said to have gathered at least an impression that the foreign office had no idea the communication would be as drastic and final as it was.

#### Japan Protests Exclusion Bill.

That Japan resents having its subjects classed with Hindus and opposes the enactment into law of her "gentlemen's agreement" to check the inflow of laborers to this country was indicated to Secretary Lansing by Ambassador Chinda, who called on President Wilson.

The proposed inclusion in a law of an informal agreement which Japan has promised on honor to fulfill, according to the agreement between former Secretary Root and former Ambassador Takahira, is understood to be repugnant to the Japanese government.

One portion of the bill which is understood to draw the resentment of the Japanese government is the inclusion, by inference at least, of Japanese in the excluded class with Hindus, although the same paragraph of the bill excepts from exclusion such as are covered in "existing agreements." This phrase refers to the Root-Takahira agreement.

For many obvious reasons the attitude of the administration is said to be one of disinclination to aggravate the situation between Japan and the United States, which has been smoldering since the California anti-Asian land law negotiations went into an indefinite stage three years ago this summer.

The administration is reported to believe there will be no difficulty in reaching an understanding.

#### Tariff on Sugar Will Continue.

The senate approved the house bill repealing the free sugar section of the tariff law, under which sugar would have gone on free list May 1. By a vote of 59 to 10 the senate receded from an amendment which it had passed extending the existing duty of 1 cent a pound for four years, and which the house refused to agree to in conference.

Democratic senators cast all of the 16 votes against supporting the house measure, which provides for a flat repeal, thus extending the present duty indefinitely. They were Senators Gore, Hardwick, Hughes, Husting, Johnson of South Dakota, Lane, Martine, Smith of Georgia, Thomas and Vardaman.

Field Marshal von der Goltz Dead. Amsterdam, via London.—Baron Kolmar von der Goltz, commander-in-chief of the first Turkish army, died of spotted fever at the headquarters of his Turkish army, according to an official announcement received here from Berlin.

#### Frowns on Memorial Day Sports.

The meaning of true Americanism and the necessity of being prepared to defend the liberty secured by the founders of this government, are emphasized by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, in a Memorial Day pamphlet issued by the department of education.

The pamphlet is for the purpose of assisting teachers in preparing suitable programs for the observation of Memorial Day, May 30. Superintendent Churchill reminds teachers that for the American citizen May 30 should be the most sacred day in the year and that the day should not be devoted to sports and games, which will mar the solemnity of the occasion.

The pamphlet contains a statement to the teachers and citizens of this state in general, in which the superintendent says:

"We cannot repeat too often the lesson that the three great attributes of this government are the sacred home, the free church and the free public school. There is danger of permitting those under our care to take too much for granted. If the lessons of patriotism are neglected, the young people of today will be unwilling when the burden of citizenship is laid upon them to make the sacrifices necessary to secure to succeeding generations the privileges which we enjoy."

### MAY PAY FIRST HALF OF TAXES AT ANY TIME

Not Necessary to Remit for Second Half Until October 5.

A taxpayer has the right to pay the first half of his taxes after April 5 without paying the second half; on payment so made interest is to be charged on the first half only, at the flat rate of one per cent for each month or part of a month that payment is deferred after April 5, according to a ruling of the state tax commission, a copy of which has been received by Sheriff Parker of Lane county.

"Under the law now in effect the second half is not due and payable until October 5, regardless of whether the first half was or was not paid by April 5," the commission held. "Prior to the date of delinquency, and conditions is October 6, the two halves represent separate and distinct obligations."

"Of course taxes may be paid in full at any time but failure to pay the first half by April 5 does not change in any respect the status of the second half nor the requirements for payment thereof."
