Mrs. M. M. Wheeler of this city filed suit yesterday afternoon against F. M. Wilkins and eleven other members of the Lane County Fair association, in which she seeks to collect \$35 which she alleges is due for cash prizes won at the last county fair.

Mrs. Wheeler says she entered certain goods in the fair and she says the premium was listed at \$50. She avers she won first prize, but received only \$15. She asks the court for judgment for the balance of the prize money.

Bank Suits Filed.
