TALISMAN OF THE CELTS.	
Romance of the Lia Fail, a Curious Piece of Stone.	
In every strongly Irish newspaper, either in America or in Ireland, there is the oft repeated threat: "Wait until we recover the Lia Fail. Then Ireland will become a republic." And the readers have asked again and again: "What is the Lia Fail? Where is it, and what is its magic power?" Those who remember the Fenian fiasco, some years ago, will recall the battery of the troops, "Ho, for the Lia Fail!" The recovery of this Celtic talisman, however, would involve something more than a victory over some outlying province of Great Britain, for it is a part of the coronation chair in Westminster Abbey. It is a curious piece of stone, a little more than two feet long, and is said to be the identical stone on which Jacob rested his head when he had his marvelous dream. It was taken to Ireland, according to tradition, before the Christian era, and its removal from that island meant the death of liberty and independence to the Celt.	
After a century of possession it was conveyed to the Ionian Islands, to be used in a coronation ceremony, and was never recovered. The kings of Scotland seized and held it as their mascot. By Edward I. it was carried to London among the spoils of war when the Scottish kingdom began to totter. The son of Edward attempted to restore the stone to the Scotch, but already it had taken such hold on the superstition of the English that they feared for their country, and a mob prevented its restoration.—Exchange.

REBELLION IN IRELAND HAS BEEN CRUSHED

Rebels Have Laid Down Their Arms and Surrendered to British Troops.

Dublin, via London.—Rebels of the rank and file followed the example of their leaders Monday and confessed the cause of the Irish republic was lost by laying down their arms at the foot of the Parnell monument in Sackville street and surrendering to British troops.

About 450 of them who had fought for a week in this central area marched out from their strongholds under the white flag and gave themselves up. A few irreconcilables continued sniping from lairs, difficult to locate, on roofs or among rafters of buildings nearby.

James Connolly, one of the leaders of the uprising, is said to be a prisoner, wounded, in the castle.

The desolation and destruction showed how severe was the fighting. The havoc appears more extensive than it actually is, owing to the amount of debris.

Every window of the law courts had been shattered. The rebels had held the building for a week.

Great damage was done in Sackville street and adjacent thoroughfares, such as Middle Abbey, Abbey Mary and Henry streets. Only a few girders and window frames of some houses remain.

Along the east side of Sackville street from Henry street to O'Connell bridge, the buildings are battered beyond recognition. The postoffice is merely a smoldering framework.

Bodies of slain rebels were being carried away in groups by soldiers, many of them having been shot several times.

BRITISH SURRENDER AT KUT-EL-AMARA

London.—With relief forces only a few miles away but unable to reach them because of floods, about 10,000 troops under Major-General Townshend, imprisoned for 143 days at Kut-el-Amara, Mesopotamia, have surrendered.

General Townshend destroyed all guns and ammunition before surrendering. He was probably driven to the extremity by the approach of starvation, as it was announced that an attempt to send a shipload of supplies had failed. The vessel grounded on the banks of the Tigris within four miles of the city. Attempts to send food to the imprisoned garrison by aeroplane also proved unsuccessful and the situation finally became hopeless.

The force under him consisted of 2700 British troops of all ranks and services, and some 6000 Indian troops and their followers.

Less than a score of miles away on the banks of the Tigris below the city is a relief army which for months had been attempting to reach the besieged forces of General Townshend.

CLUBS OPPOSE ROOSEVELT

Western Washington German-Americans to Fight Nomination.

Tacoma, Wash.—In emphatic terms the German-American republican clubs of western Washington went on record as opposing the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt as republican candidate for the presidency. Representatives were present from Tacoma, Seattle, Everett, Olympia, Chehalis, Puyallup and Orting. A resolution opposing Roosevelt was adopted. It is to be submitted to the delegates attending the state convention at North Yakima.

"We trust you will read this resolution as a suggestion to the delegates who will go to the republican convention in Chicago," is the suggestion to accompany the resolution. Colonel Roosevelt was denounced by numerous speakers, some of them saying that under no possible condition or circumstances would a German-American vote for him if nominated.

Battle of Verdun Considered Ended

Paris.—The battle of Verdun may now be considered as ended, according to the opinion prevailing in French military circles.

The announcement of the decoration of General Petain and other high officers who have taken part in the battle is regarded as an indication that the French authorities share the view that the task of defending Verdun has been brought to an end.

Sheriff and Posse Members Are Slain

Fort Collins, Colo.—Frank Roach, sheriff of Cheyenne, Wyo., and Nels Nelson, rancher, 18 miles west of Cheyenne, were shot and killed 35 miles northwest of Box Elder, Colo., while heading a posse hunting horse thieves. The thieves escaped.

HOUSTON APPROVES LAND GRANT BILL

Will Later Try to Get Some Areas for Forest Reserve.

Washington.—The secretary of agriculture submitted to the house public lands committee his report upon the Ferris-Chamberlain Oregon-California land grant bill. He says that, although the bill does not contain all the provisions recommended by his department, it is a fair and satisfactory measure, and he approves its passage.

The report, however, criticizes the designation of all lands as agricultural not classified as power sites or timber lands, and insists that lands not physically fit for farming purposes should not be designated as agricultural. The report also reiterates the contention of the department that 300,000 acres in the grant lying within the boundaries of existing national forests should be added to such forests, and suggests a separate bill to accomplish this plan.

Deadlock Over Von Igel Papers.

The state department and the German embassy apparently are at a deadlock over the disposition of papers seized by agents of the department of justice, when they raided the offices in New York of Wolfe von Igel, former secretary to Captain von Papen, recalled military attache of the embassy.

The state department is willing to return the papers, as demanded by the German ambassador, if he or some other responsible official of the embassy will identify them as being official. Count von Bernstorff insists on having all the documents removed from the office and refuses to identify any of them personally unless directed to do so by his government.

Regarding published reports that the state department had made possible the capture of Sir Roger Casement by turning over information to the British government, Secretary Lansing said emphatically that the department had no knowledge of Sir Roger's expedition until after he had been captured. It was said that there was nothing in the papers taken from Von Igel which would have shown that such an expedition was on foot.

Philippine Bill Provokes Fight.

There is possibility of deadlock between the two houses over the Clarke amendment to the Philippine government bill. This is the amendment tacked on by the senate under which freedom is directed to be given the Filipinos in not less than two nor more than four years, except as to certain contingencies.

Republican members of the insular affairs committee claim they will be able to muster votes enough to strike out the Clarke amendment. A careful count of noses, they say, shows that only three or four members of the minority will vote for this part of the bill, and that 30 democrats will vote against it. This would give only a narrow margin of defeat, but friends of the bill, while admitting the contest will be close, assert that a majority will be found favoring the bill just as it came from the senate.

Uniform Grading of Grain Is Provided.

Against the protest of the New York Produce exchange and other opposition, the house adopted as part of the agricultural appropriation bill the Ruby bill for uniform grading of grain. The bill fixes uniform grades in grain and is designed to prevent deception in grain traffic and to encourage the trade under uniform standards. It authorizes the secretary of agriculture to fix, establish and promulgate grain grades, and compel their use wherever grain is shipped in interstate or foreign commerce and sold by grade.

Safety Work Is Shown.

Hundreds of exhibits illustrative of the methods of the federal government in caring, through its many agencies, for the lives and property of its citizens, were assembled here for the safety first special, a 12-coach train scheduled to leave the capital Monday on an education tour through thousands of cities and towns.

A half dozen government departments are co-operating in equipping the exposition train. How lives are saved under ground by the bureau of mines and at sea by the coast guard service will be shown in illustrated lectures and in motion pictures. Other pictures and exhibits will demonstrate what the forest service and reclamation service are doing for conservation of property in the west, and a large picture gallery will show in rich color the range and magnificence of the country's national parks.

Roosevelt For National Suffrage.

New York.—In a signed statement prepared here for a committee of women representing the Congressional Union, who appealed to him as the head of the progressive party, Colonel Roosevelt declared that the question of enfranchising women has become national and pledged his support of the proposed amendment to the federal constitution.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

The Rogue River Baptist association held its session at Grants Pass.

The annual school fair of the Lebanon schools was held last week.

Corn shows will be held this year in Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties.

City Health Officer Miles estimates there are 60 cases of measles in Salem.

The forty-fourth annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer association will be held in Portland Thursday, June 22.

The 12th annual convention of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association held a three days' session at Astoria.

Lumbermen of eastern Oregon have decided to take severe measures to stamp out bootlegging in the logging camps.

An entire block with the exception of two buildings was destroyed by fire at Hubbard. The loss amounted to \$10,000.

Governor Withycombe has appointed Dr. William M. Pearce of La Grande, a member of the state board of examiners in optometry.

The state grange of Oregon will meet in Grants Pass for its annual session on May 9, and will continue in session till May 12.

Pupils of the east end of the county carried off honors in the finals of the third annual Umatilla county championship spelling contest.

The school board at Roseburg will open bids next Saturday for the erection of the proposed high school building to be erected at Roseburg.

A new sawmill of 50,000 daily capacity is to be erected on the line of the new railroad being built by the Twoby Brothers company in Grants Pass.

The entire 200 acres for the growing of flax in Lane county under the plan of experiment inaugurated by the Eugene chamber of commerce has been secured.

Within a week operations will resume on a large scale at the Black Butte quicksilver mines near Cottage Grove, which have been inactive for seven years.

Twenty-three suffragists, leaders in the national campaign for the enfranchisement of women, reached Oregon Saturday on the "Suffragette Special" from California.

Jones Brothers & Co. of Portland have decided to locate a loganberry juice plant at Newberg. Machinery is to be installed May 15 and work is to begin June 1.

The Umatilla county court has entered an order placing on the ballot at the primary election the question of a bond issue of \$980,000 for permanent road improvement.

Clatsop county has reimbursed a number of leading citizens of the county who advanced the sum of \$26,000 to complete the Columbia river highway in that county last season.

Three hundred stockmen and their wives invaded Baker Monday to attend the annual convention of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon, held Monday and Tuesday.

It is reported that a deal has been closed for the operation of the big ship yards at Bandon, which have been idle for some years past, and that the building of two new vessels will begin at once.

Under the leadership of the civic improvement committee appointed by Mayor Eastes, Bend is about to start on a "swat-the-fly" campaign. The children in the schools are being organized to assist in the work.

M. S. Robb, agronomist at the University of Idaho, had been appointed county agriculturist for Lane county to succeed R. B. Coghlan, who resigned to become state leader of county agriculturists for Washington.

South bound freight train No. 221, Southern Pacific, jumped the track on a down grade on Rice hill, 25 miles north of Roseburg. Twelve cars were wrecked, nine being demolished. An unidentified man traveling as a "hobo" was fatally injured.

As the sequel to the ducking of Prof. W. B. Young, principal of the Albany high school by students, Oren Jenkins, a student of Albany college, was fined \$50 and costs, the maximum, on a charge of assault and battery, in Justice Swan's court.

That part of the Chemawa Indian school, relating to agriculture and to home economics, has been placed in charge of the O. A. C. extension service. The institute will be held during the first five days in August.

Two hundred and fifty-eight accidents, of which two were fatal, were reported to the state industrial accident commission during the week ending April 27. Guy Lane, of Mist, and Orval Winters, of Balistun, were killed while logging. This was the greatest number of accidents reported during any week since the organization of the commission. Increased industrial activity is given the credit.
