MILLS WILL ADVANCE PRICES ON FIR LUMBER

Trade Becoming Nearly Normal; Logs Scarce; Labor Higher.

Tacoma, Wash., April 26.—Seventy-eight mills of Washington and Oregon were represented at an informal meeting of lumbermen held in Tacoma today to consider general manufacturing and marketing conditions.

The situation, as canvassed, reveals increases showing strongly in all monthly cost sheets, short stocks at mills, and selling values anywhere from 50 cents to \$2 under the price prevailing in the April, 1913, market, which was considered normal.

Another feature of the meeting was the unanimous report of a log scarcity. In all districts labor was reported higher.

A number of mills represented advised of having listed the trade, or intending to list the trade, at what is equivalent to a horizontal advance of 50c on all fir items.

Cottage Grove, Ore., April 30.—(To the Editor.)—I have just received the clipping enclosed by you from The Sentinel and in reply will say that I have neither the time nor the inclination to enter into any discussion with anyone who has not the backbone to sign his name to such an article.

If the writer of the article is really a granger (which I doubt) I am perfectly willing to go to his grange and listen to any suggestions or advice that may be offered by any taxpayer that would in any way reduce the expense of this work in this county.

And further, I would welcome a comparison of the expense of fruit inspection for the past three years with the expense of this work five years ago, notwithstanding the fact that we have nine or ten thousand acres more orchards to look after and a very widespread outbreak of pear blight to contend with.
