SENTINEL LOSES ITS CASE AGAINST CLERK

Favorable Decision Would Have Given Paper More Than It Had Asked For.

Holding that the act of the legislature of 1891, requiring the publication of the claims allowed by the county courts of the state each month did not intend that the full proceedings of the court should be published, Judge G. F. Skipworth, of the circuit for Lane county, sustained the demurrer to the writ of mandamus filed recently by Elbert Bede, publisher of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, against Stacy M. Russell, county clerk, in an endeavor to compel that official to furnish The Sentinel with a full report of the proceedings of the court each month for publication.

Judge Skipworth quotes the sections of the act which pertains to the publication of the proceedings of the court and says: "Section 1 of the act (where it says the list of claims must be published) makes no provision whatever for the publication of any part of the proceedings of the county court except such schedule of the expenses of the county."

Further he says that the only authority for publishing the proceedings of the county court is found in Section 2 of the act, but quotes a case—the State against McGowan—in which Judge Lord gave this opinion: "The rule is well

established that where the law of the legislature is fairly susceptible of two different meanings, that should be preferred which excludes and prevents the consequences that are mischievous and unjust."

Judge Skipworth in his opinion says: "To construe the statute otherwise would result in consequences that would be mischievous and unjust for the reason that many of the proceedings of the county court relate to matters affecting private individuals only, and in which the public at large has no interest either directly or indirectly; for instance, the change of a county road or the appointment of a justice of the peace to fill a vacancy and many other matters the court could enumerate. The people of Lane county and of the various counties of the state are directly interested in the expenditures of the county courts of the various counties of the public monies and in order that the greatest publicity might be given to the expenditures of the county funds the act of 1891 was passed by the legislature. The legislature never intended and it would be unreasonable to hold that it intended that all of the proceedings of the county courts of the state should be published, and paid for by the counties."

In bringing the suit the official papers had no idea that a decision in their favor would mean the publication of the matter which the court holds it would have meant. Even according to the adverse decision the official papers are entitled to proceedings which they are not now getting.

Fair Board to Contest Suit.

The board of directors of the Lane County Fair association will contest the suit of Mrs. M. M. Wheeler, recently filed in the Eugene justice court, in which she seeks to recover the sum of \$35 from the board, alleged due as a premium on an exhibit which she and at the last fair in Eugene.

Mrs. Wheeler had an exhibit of farm products at the fair. The judges decided that the exhibit was not entitled to a premium, but the board, at a meeting afterward, decided to give her \$15 to pay the expenses of transporting it to and from Eugene. As the premium for such an exhibit was advertised by the board to be \$50, Mrs. Wheeler now seeks to recover the difference between what she was paid and what she claims she should have received.
