**DISAGREEMENT OF JURY IN BOOTLEGGING CASE**

After being out about six hours the jury in the bootlegging case of the State vs. Mary L. Henderson tried here yesterday were unable to agree and were discharged. It is understood that the vote was 5 to 1 for conviction.

The principal part of the testimony was from women who had been working at the place or had visited there. The state sought to prove that Mrs. Henderson, through one of the young women, had secured more than the legal quantity of beer within 28 days.

This is the second time Mrs. Henderson has been tried on a similar charge. In a former case she was acquitted. Her husband, Frank Henderson, was tried on a similar charge some time ago. Once he was found guilty. On appeal the jury twice disagreed and finally acquitted him.
