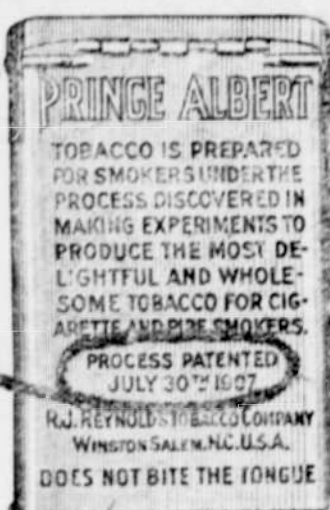

REPLY OF GERMANY POSTPONES BREAK

Rupture Averted, at Least For Present, is View of Washington Officials.

Washington.—Germany's note has postponed, if it actually has not averted, a diplomatic break with the United States.

Cabinet members went over the unofficial text carefully with the president, and, while they refused to discuss it, they reflected the view that a break had been averted; that Germany's new assurances would be accorded the test of time, notwithstanding the reference to the action Germany expects the United States to take against Great Britain's restraints on neutral trade.

A note to Germany has practically been completed and will go forward to Berlin. It is understood it will be brief, informing Germany that as long as the new instructions to submarine commanders are observed, diplomatic relations will be continued, but that the United States cannot allow Germany to dictate its negotiations with Great Britain.

While the German note has averted, for the present at least, a break in diplomatic relations, it was said that the president was not satisfied with the apparent conditions attached by Germany. The United States stands by its demand that Germany cease her attacks on vessels in violation of international law, regardless of negotiations which may be carried on with Great Britain over the food blockade.

Peace Offer Interests Wilson.

President Wilson read with careful attention the portion of the note touching on peace.

The note says: "The German government, conscious of Germany's strength, twice within the last few months announced before the world its readiness to make peace on a basis of safeguarding Germany's vital interests, thus indicating it is not Germany's fault if peace is still withheld from the nations of Europe."

While it was indicated that President Wilson would make no further peace moves until the allied governments have signified their willingness to receive suggestions on the subject, some officials thought the German note might possibly draw forth something from the allies.

Rural Credits Bill Adopted by Senate.

The administration's rural credit bill was passed by the senate. The measure successfully ran the gamut of all amendments aimed at its vital principles and was adopted by a vote of 58 to 5.

It provides a system of banks from which agriculturists can borrow on securities available to the average farmer, but which would not be accepted as collateral in regular banking institutions.

Under the legislative program of the steering committee, the next bill to have the right of way is the good roads bill, which seeks to appropriate more than \$50,000,000 extending over a period of years for the improvement of highways, the federal government sharing the expenses with the states on an even basis.

National Banks Report Foreign Loans. The controller of the currency issued a call to all national banks, requiring them to report to him their condition at the close of business on Monday, May 1.

In their answers to this call, national banks are required to inform the controller of their investments in foreign securities, particularly those of nations now engaged in war. The result is expected to show for the first time just how much of the \$500,000,000 loan to the entente allies came directly or indirectly from national banks, as well as how much Germany or Austria may have secured through the same sources.

President Writes Indorsing Brandeis. President Wilson sent a letter to Senator Culberson, chairman of the judiciary committee, giving his strong personal indorsement to Louis D. Brandeis, nominated for the supreme court, and urging that he be favorably reported and confirmed.

The letter was intended to bring wavering members of the committee into line for a favorable report.

In the president sets forth his position with regard to the appointment. He states what he believes to be the qualifications of Mr. Brandeis and, it is understood, in a measure replies to some of the charges that have been made against him.

Pershing's Men Locate Villa.

El Paso, Texas.—A brief wireless message received here from General Pershing states that his forces have located Villa and are now in close pursuit of him. The radiogram was sent to General Funston.

While no details were given of the renewed chase, it is believed that Villa has been located south of San Antonio, probably southwest of Parral, in the district where he was last seen.

A TAXPAYER.

All News to Be "Colored." Eugene City, Ore., May 1.—All Pacific coast paper factories have begun the gradual elimination of aniline dye from

their print paper-making processes, according to an announcement made here today at the offices of the Crown-Willamette and the Hawley Pulp and Paper company mills. Already the use of aniline products has been reduced 50 per cent, and gradually it will be dropped, owing to great increase in the cost of the products since the war began.

The ultimate result of the elimination of aniline for the print paper-making process will be to turn out newspaper stock the natural color of the pulp.

Trains Will Remain on Run.

John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, has denied that overland passenger trains Nos. 53 and 54 will be taken off the run. He recently went to San Francisco to confer with higher officials regarding train service and schedules, but said that these trains will remain on. He admits that such action was discussed by the officials.
