OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past
Week Briefly Compiled for
Our Readers.

Election of delegates to the party national conventions, a contest for the nomination of secretary of state, and the presidential primary were the distinguishing features of the election over the state Friday. The contests were confined almost exclusively to the republican party. The progressives had no county ticket anywhere and voted for their delegates and presidential electors and wrote in the names of Roosevelt for president, and Hiram Johnson for vice president. The democrats had contests for delegates; gave Wilson their unqualified endorsement and supported Tom Marshall as against Weeks for the vice presidential nomination.

Justice Hughes was the choice of republicans in every county from which returns have been received. Cummins ran second and Burton third. William Grant Webster, of Illinois, received the endorsement for vice president in the republican primaries. His was the only name on the ballot for that position.

Delegates to the republican convention, pledged to Hughes, will be Charles H. Carey, Charles W. Fulton, George J. Cameron and Daniel Boyd from the state at large, with Abraham and Bishop from the first district, Brooke and Burgess from the second district and Hoyt and Hotchkiss from the third district.

Democratic delegates will probably be A. S. Bennett, W. L. Morgan, J. W. Morrow, and T. H. Crawford. From the first district Jackson and Turner, and from the second district Petersen and King. The third district will have Lovejoy and Parker.

Republican presidential electors will be W. I. Cottell, R. R. Butler, W. P. Keady, W. C. North and J. F. Wilson. The democratic electors are O. P. Ceshow, B. E. Hauey, P. J. Neff, D. W. Shehan, J. H. Stevenson. The progressive delegates will be H. W. Coe, A. E. Clark, L. S. Beveridge, P. H. Bucholtz, D. L. Povey, and the electors are Emmett Calahan, F. H. Lewis, M. M. Clark, A. I. Moulton and T. P. Campbell.

All three congressmen have been renominated; Hawley of the first and Sinnott of the second without opposition. McArthur defeated Lafferty and Littlefield, having a clear majority.

Secretary of State Ben Olcott has apparently carried every county in the state against C. B. Moores and will lead by thousands.

For public service commissioner, T. K. Campbell, who has been a member of the commission since it was organized, has been defeated for renomination by Fred Buchtel, who is state seal of weights and measures. This was in the western district. In the eastern district the winner in the contest is in doubt. Corey and Wright have substantial leads over their competitors, but the contest between them is close. The successful candidate in the eastern district will be immediately appointed to the commission by the governor, vice Clyde Alitchison, resigned.

Three uncontested nominations were those of George H. Burnett and Frank H. Moore, for the supreme court, candidates for renomination; and John D. Mickie, state dairy and food commissioner.

The annual convention of the Oregon Title Men's association will be held June 7 and 8 in Portland.

Arrangements have been completed for Cottage Grove's third annual Chautauqua, which will be held June 8 to 13.

Baker grammar school pupils saved \$963.22 in the last 18 weeks, since the school savings plan was inaugurated.

The Women's Auxiliary of the Eugene chamber of commerce will hold its annual rose show Thursday, May 25.

"Humane week" was observed in Oregon City and Clackamas county under the supervision of the Clackamas County Humane Society.

Four buildings in the group of six at the Oregon penitentiary were gutted by fire of unknown origin, entailing a loss of approximately \$50,000.

Albany is to have a loganberry plant and it will be established in time to handle this year's crop of loganberries and will take all that can be furnished.

At a special election the voters of Canby authorized the council by a large majority to issue bonds in the sum of \$18,000 for the construction or purchase of a municipal water system.
