May 16.—Council met in adjourned session.

Contract for digging ditch from Sixth street to the O. P. & E. railway tracks was let to Percy Rogers for \$114.
Petition for paving of Second street was laid on the table until it is ascertained what will be done with the rock quarry.

On motion it was ordered that the city advertise for bids for from 10,000 to 15,000 feet of crushed rock on a con-

tract extending to 1920, 1,000 yards to be paid for before January 1, 1917, whether used or not.

On motion it was recommended that the park board give the I. O. O. F. lodge permission to use the city park for their annual picnic. A license was granted giving the I. O. O. F. lodge exclusive right to concessions during the picnic.

On motion it was ordered that two suitable toilets be built in the city park.
