LIFTS RESTRICTIONS ON SAVINGS DEPOSITS

Limit Raised to \$1000, Which May Be Deposited at Any Time.

Larger postal savings deposits will now be accepted by the postal banks. This is made possible by an important amendment to the postal savings act just approved by President Wilson.

A postal savings depositor may now have an account amounting to \$1000 upon which interest will be paid. Formerly \$500 was the maximum amount he could have to his credit.

Another feature of the amendment that will avoid further embarrassment to the public and to postal officials is the doing away with the limit on the amount that could be accepted from a depositor monthly. Under the old law only \$100 could be deposited in a calendar month. The amendment abolishes this restriction.

Sues to Quiet Title.

Frank J. Sly has filed suit in the circuit court against Mary Danbrook, Thomas T. Elliott, Charles M. Elliott and the unknown heirs of Lizzie Hamilton, deceased, in which the plaintiff seeks to quiet title to certain property in Cottage Grove. The plaintiff alleges Lizzie Hamilton was the owner of one-third equity in this property. She sold

to other parties many years ago, but the deed of the sale was not recorded. Mr. Sly asks that the defendants appear in court and show any interest which they might have in this land.

SUPERVISORS RE-ELECTED AND SALARIES REDUCED

Will Have to Pay Own Expenses Over \$35 a Month.

Miss Jennie M. Bossen and A. I. O'Reilly, the two county school supervisors of Lane were re-elected by the county board of education at a meeting held Thursday.

A change in their salary for the coming year was made in that it will be \$100 a month instead of \$110 a month, but the expense money allowed them this year is \$35 a month instead of \$25 a month as last year. The board made a ruling at the meeting that if the monthly expense of either of the supervisors is more than \$35 this year they will be compelled to pay the surplus themselves.

Cutting Out Crossing.

The work of changing the Pacific highway at a point between Eugene and Goshen to eliminate one of the worst railroad crossings in the state has been started by the Lane county court. The road will extend beneath a railroad trestle a few rods south of the crossing and will pass beneath the trestle diagonally so as to avoid as far as possible collisions between automobiles.

To pass beneath the trestle at right angles would create a hazard in that there would be a "blind" corner, as the road exists parallel with the railroad track some distance on either side, and to turn squarely at the trestle the automobile and team drivers could not discern vehicles coming toward them from the other side any distance away.

The county court and the Southern Pacific will each stand half of the expense of making this change.

University Issues Handsome Book.
