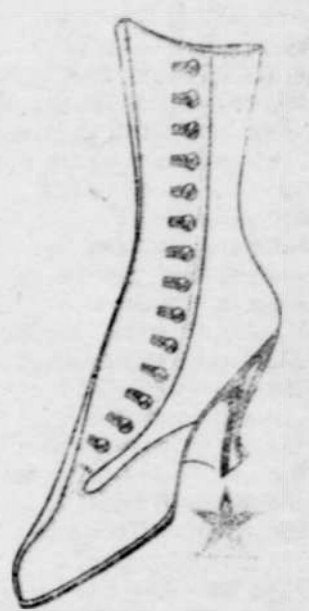

MRS. HENDERSON IS INDICTED ON 2 COUNTS

Violation of Prohibition Law and Keeping House of Ill Fame Are Charges Brought Against Much-Tried Cottage Grove Woman.

Mrs. Matilda Henderson, who has been arrested several times on different charges connected with violating the local option and prohibition laws during the past several months, was indicted by the Lane county grand jury Friday on the charge of violating the prohibition law and on the charge of setting

up and keeping a house of ill fame.

Mrs. Henderson is charged in one indictment with having sold liquor to Philip Hohl April 1, 1916, and in the other indictment with having kept a disorderly house at 153 North Lane street in Cottage Grove, where she kept and harbored L. R. Fisher, Babe LaFord, Ethel Grissom and other women.
