Superintendent Beattie Complimented.

The Alaska Daily Empire, published at Juneau, Alaska, has the following to say editorially concerning professor W. G. Beattie, recently elected superintendent of the Cottage Grove schools:

"The decision of Prof. W. G. Beattie to quit his work in Alaska is regrettable. Prof. Beattie has done a man's work among the Indians of Alaska. He has contributed a great deal to aid the Thlinget march toward civilization. A man of high ideals, an active mind and prodigious energy and industry, he had not only imparted knowledge to the Thlingets, but even better, he has aroused desire for higher things and enthusiasm among them. He was quick to grasp the need for Indian preparation for the new conditions which surround them—the need for capacity to make a living in a white man's country, the need to observe the rules and methods of work and conduct of a civilized people, the need for adjustment to the principles and codes of civilization. He saw that it was necessary for the Indians to know how and why, and to be prepared to do for themselves. He has taught how and why and inspired the desire to do. He has urged, and successfully, industry, intelligent and capable work, economy, the need of practicing sound business principles, honesty, the observance of the rules of sanitation, the necessity and glory of good citizenship and good morals. He has inspired the Indian forward and upward. He has planted the seeds that will count for future happiness as well as for present good.

"It will be difficult for the government to fill the void that will be created in Thlinget life by the departure of Prof. Beattie."

LANE PUBLISHERS ORGANIZE

Cottage Grove Editor Is Elected to Presidency.

The Lane County Publishers' association was organized at Eugene Saturday afternoon with the publisher of every paper in the county as a member.

Elbert Bede, of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, was chosen president; W. F. Gilstrap, of the Morning Register, Eugene, vice-president, and W. C. Parry, of the Junction City Times, secretary.

Other members are W. H. Weather-son, of the Florence West; R. S. Huston, of the Siuslaw Pilot; J. E. Shelton, of the Eugene Daily Guard; J. C. Dinan, of the Springfield News, and George H. Baxter, of the Creswell Chronicle.

A resolution was adopted at the meeting as follows:

"Resolved, That we endorse the effort of the state editorial association to establish a legal rate equivalent to five cents a line.

"We recommend that the state association make an effort to define a legal newspaper as one which has been in existence not less than six months and must have at least 250 paying subscribers.

"We recommend that the state association make an effort to have a law adopted whereby no case can be closed without a receipt attached to all affidavits of publication."
