## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

### Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

Yamhill county will expend \$108,000 this year on its roads.

Gasoline is fast replacing horses in all lines of industry in Grant county. The official opening of the highway between Astoria and Seaside took place last week.

In spite of the heavy rains of the past week the Mosier cherry crop is exceeding estimates.

Buyers are in the market around Union for cavalry horses, and all available animals of that class are being eagerly sought.

No report of injury to the Oregon hop crop from the severe rain storms has been made and on the whole the crop has been much benefited.

Clarence E. Albin, claim agent for the state industrial accident commission, will succeed Major Carle Abrams as a member of the commission.

Employees of the state who have left their places to go with the militia are to be paid one month's salary, in lieu of their regular vacation on pay.

Joint committees of Marshfield and North Bend have decided to call the railroad celebration August 24, 25 and 26 the Coos Bay Railroad Jubilee.

Albany's new plant for the manufacture of fruit juices was placed in operation Friday, and the first Albany-made loganberry juice came from the presses.

The continued downpour of rain in Lane county has resulted in a loss of thousands of dollars to cherry growers, according to statements made by growers.

Roseburg is about ready at last to go ahead with its railroad project from that place to Rock Creek, after having one bond issue declared illegal and voting another.

More than 100 jewelers from all sections of Oregon will attend the ninth annual convention of the Oregon Retail Jewelers' association at Albany July 24 and 25.

The annual conventions and camp-meetings of the Evangelical association of Oregon will open at Jennings Lodge, near Portland, July 24, and continue for 10 days.

Only 124,444 yards of material have to be removed from the Columbia river entrance channel before there will be a fairway 40 feet deep and 700 feet wide into the river.

An effort to repeal certain features of the Oregon lien law and substitute for them the law as in force in Washington will be made at the next session of the legislature.

There are at present 1152 Indians living on the Umatilla reservation, according to a compilation of records by Major E. L. Swartzlander, superintendent of the agency.

Four members of the fifth company, Coast Artillery Corps, Oregon national guard of Albany, refused to take the oath when the company was sworn into the federal service.

Unofficial reports from the survey of the Siuslaw river bar, being conducted by the United States engineers, show that there is a depth of 16 feet on the bar at low tide.

The heavy rains, which have been repeated every day since June 24, practically have insured the largest wheat crop to Morrow county since the bumper crop of 1894.

The Silverton pool of 60,000 pounds, one of the largest unsold lots of wool in this state and largest in the Willamette valley, was sold at private sale to a Boston firm for 35 cents.

In the past six weeks George M. Newman of Albany and C. M. Flickinger, who resides north of Albany, have captured 68 skunks for the purpose of starting a skunk farm near Albany.

Rev. Louis S. Cupp, pastor of the First Christian church in Eugene, the largest of the denomination on the Pacific coast, has accepted the position of chancellor of the University of Kansas City.

George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, was also made secretary of the desert land board by the state board of control, the board concluding that Mr. Brown could easily fill both positions.

Cloudbursts struck in several places over Umatilla county and did considerable damage. The town of Felix was almost inundated, basements filling and streets running waist deep with water.

Advance Lodge, No. 105, Knights of Pythias, of Vale, has adopted a resolution to pay \$10 a month to the dependent wife, parent or child of any member of the lodge who shall answer the call to arms.

What will be probably the largest silo in Oregon is now under construction at the grounds of the beet sugar factory of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company at Grants Pass. It will be 150 feet wide by 300 feet long and will be excavated to a depth of 18 feet. The silo is to be used for the storage of pulp from the manufacture of sugar.
