Ordinance No. 428, granting permit to the Standard Oil Co. to establish station, read first, second and third times and passed.

Reports of the marshal, recorder and treasurer were read and ordered placed on file.

The semi-annual report of the treasurer was referred to the finance committee.

The street committee was instructed to have a catch basin placed at the Burkholder corner and to have the street repaired.

Upon motion the city engineer was instructed to prepare plans for changing pipe line at the intake. The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance for the change and to advertise for bids.
