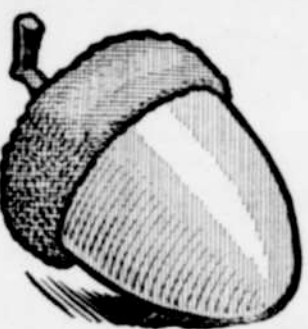

NESMITH TO ACCEPT IF POSSIBLE

Prospective Democratic Candidate Provisionally Accepts Nomination for State Legislature.

Linn W. Nesmith has accepted the nomination of the democratic party as candidate for election to the state legislature as a representative from Lane county provided his connection with the Third Oregon regiment does not interfere with his candidacy.

Following is Mr. Nesmith's letter to the chairman and members of the Lane county democratic central committee:

"Gentlemen: I am in favor of your communication of July 28, 1916, advising me of the removal of the Hon. Joseph E. Tuttle from Lane county, and further advising me that the nomination for legislator from Lane county in the lower house of the 29th legislative assembly has fallen to me.

"It is with great pleasure and with appreciation of the high honor to be a candidate for election that I accept the nomination provided my duties in Co. M, Third Oregon infantry, are such that I can qualify if elected, and I will take the matter up with the military authorities here and advise you whether or not my acceptance would be inconsistent with the duties which I owe the cause in which I am enlisted. As soon as I obtain their decision regarding this matter I will advise you, and if it is possible for me to qualify, and if I am elected, I will certainly do all in my power to represent the people of Lane county.

Mr. Nesmith is now with his regiment at Palm City, Calif., near the Mexican border. He becomes a candidate through the removal from the county of Joseph E. Tuttle, who was nominated in the primaries.

LANE COUNTY'S TAXES LARGEST

Total Amount to Be Collected This Year Is \$1,039,442.14.

The state tax commission has just compiled from the returns made by the assessors a list showing the total amount of taxes to be raised in each county in the state this year. CANADA THISTLE IS FARM MENACE

County Agricultural Agent Describes Number of Methods for Destroying the Weed.

N. S. Robb, the county agricultural agent, has found the Canada thistle to be a threatening menace to the farmers of Lane county, and has collected the following information relative to the removal of the pest.

"There are many weeds that are troublesome on the farms of Lane county, but the one that needs some serious consideration at present is the Canada thistle. Once this weed infests a field it will spread rapidly, if not more so than any other perennial weed. It is also one of the most difficult to eradicate and only one who has had experience in combating it can fully realize the importance of preventing its spread.

"Although the Canada thistle closely resembles the common Scotch or bull thistle, the individual plants are not found growing single like the latter, but always in colonies or groups which rapidly spread over an area. It also differs from the bull thistle in being somewhat smaller; it does not have quite as dark foliage, nor as large flowers and it is perennial, while the latter is biennial or lives only two years.

"After the thistle has once made a foothold, the only way one can eradicate it is to prevent it from making any growth above ground for from one to three years. Any practice that will starve the roots will finally cause the plants to die.

"There are several ways of keeping the top growth down. No one method has been found to be satisfactory in all cases. If one starts in to clean his field of thistle, he should make up his mind beforehand that it is no easy job and that he is going to keep at it persistently for two or three years. Lack of persistence more than method is too often the cause of failure in eradication.

"When the thistle first appears it can be handled successfully generally by growing a cultivated crop on the land and by using sweeps (hoes) in the cultivation in place of shovels and by cultivating quite frequently. In the case of a crop like corn, hoeing would have to displace cultivation later in the season.

"Where only a small patch occurs, smothering has, in some cases, been quite successful. Heavy paper or straw is used, but straw is not always successful unless a depth of three feet or more is used.

"In fields that are badly infested, and where the surface is matted over a large area with the thistles, one of the most satisfactory ways is to plow the field before the thistle blossoms and disc twice a week until a check is obtained in their growth and then only at such times as the tops appear above the ground. Salting and pasturing with sheep have not generally proved satisfactory methods when on a large scale.

"Seed of the thistle was introduced on the farm of W. J. Schoren, south of Eugene, by planting orchard grass containing weed seed. He says he has had fair success in getting rid of the weed by cutting the tops off as far in the ground as possible with a grubbing hoe. It was necessary to cut the tops every few days at first, but now only a few appear and those not so quickly as at first. Mr. Schoren believes that, while clean cultivation is often effective, it is not so successful here as in other sections on account of the long growing period. He also says that too much attention cannot be given to preventing its spread over the county.

"George Robertson, living north of Santa Clara, finds that the growing of cultivated crops or clean culture is only fairly successful. He has a method of his own which he uses along with clean culture of crop and which is getting results for him.

"His method is to keep the top cut off and squirt from one to two teaspoonfuls of a mixture of equal parts of coal oil and sheep dip in the stems with an oil can. This treatment is given each plant after the tops are cut off. Clean culture and the use of this liquid continuously for two or three seasons will eradicate them, according to Mr. Robertson.

"The weed is being spread in this locality in the majority of cases by overflow water, which makes it doubly hard to eradicate. Nevertheless, one should use great care not to allow the weed to become established and thus one may save several years of work that would be necessary again to rid a field of the pest."
