456 VOTERS REGISTER SINCE MAY PRIMARIES

Since the primaries in May a total of 456 voters in Lane county have registered at the office of the county clerk. Of these 179 are women voters.

With the approach of election time again, it is expected that the registration will begin to pick up from this time on. Clerk Russell says all of 4000 voters in the county have so far failed to register this year. The books close again October 7, a little less than a month before election. JUDGE BOWN SAYS KEEP LAND OFF ROLL

Ex-Governor West Claims That Tax May Be Collected Later If It Is Found to Be Legal.

County Judge Harry L. Bown, who has taken a great deal of interest in the matter of collecting the taxes from the Oregon and California grant lands, is of the opinion that it would be better to keep the lands off the roll this year. By keeping them off the rolls complications will be avoided, the judge believes. He is in accord with ex-Governor Oswald West, who is now special agent for the federal government in the disposition of these lands. The ex-governor has issued a statement designed to inform county officials on the right of counties to continue on or return to the tax roll lands in the grant previously held by railway company.

The Lane county rolls are almost ready to go to the binder, and Assessor Keeney has been instructed to put in a number of blank pages so that in case it is determined to put these lands on the rolls there will be room enough for their description.

Mr. West claims that to assess a tax

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against these lands would complicate matters so the government could not dispose of the lands and that the state would lose nothing by failing to tax the lands this year, as it would be possible to levy the tax later in case it should be found that the lands are taxable.

If the tax is levied, the county must pay the state its part of the tax, whether the county collects it or not.

Senator L. E. Bean is firmly of the opinion that these lands having once been upon the tax rolls, it is unconstitutional for the government to attempt to remove them from the rolls.

Ira Conner Dies.
Ira K. Conner died at the St. Vincent hospital, Portland, this morning, aged 32 years, 1 month and 20 days, following an operation which revealed cancer of the liver. Mr. Conner was born in this city July 4, 1884, and was a son of Ira and Susan Conner.

A number of years ago while at work on the lumber dock of the Booth Kelly mill at Saginaw, he was stricken with paralysis, from the effects of which he never fully recovered, having been in poor health since that time. His mother died a few years ago, but he is survived by his aged father, Ira Conner, four brothers, Horace, Charles, Harry and Rose, and three half brothers, William, Edward and Fred.

Funeral services will be conducted in this city tomorrow at 2 o'clock p. m.

A. J. Young Sues for Divorce.
Alleging that his wife, Ruby E., became infatuated with another man and has ceased to love him, A. J. Young began suit yesterday in the circuit court for a divorce.

In his complaint the plaintiff alleges that they were married at Spokane, Wash., January 2, 1902. Six years ago, at Valley, Wash., he alleges, she met and became infatuated with one Bert Bay. He says she lost her affection for the plaintiff and treated him with the utmost indifference. She lost all concern or interest in him or his business, he avers.

He alleges that she received letters from Bay and the letters showed that preconcerted arrangement had been made between them that she should obtain a divorce and go to Idaho, where they would wed.—Register.

Theaters May Remain Open.
The Dallas city council has decided not to appeal from the decision of Circuit Judge Bell, who last week set aside the city ordinance prohibiting the operation of theaters on Sunday.

The council, however, it is said, is considering the matter of increasing the license fees for motion picture houses.

The Eugene theater men were anxious that the Dallas council take the matter to the supreme court in the hope that the higher tribunal would finally determine the status of the city ordinance, which is similar to the one in force in Eugene. The theater men hope to see the decision of Judge Bell sustained so that they may be able to operate their theaters on Sunday.
