SUPPORTING DEMOCRATS, AND HONESTY.

STRIKE SEEMS CERTAIN.

THE PROBABILITY of a great national strike of railway trainmen seems more certain every day, and it is more than likely that the strike orders issued to become effective September 4 will go into effect.

Despite the fact that the general public will eventually pay the bills, and the belief that in these democratic times the trainmen are getting wages with which they should be satisfied, there will be considerable public sympathy with them. The way they have conducted themselves during the conferences has made a favorable impression. The feeling that has shown the greatest development, however, is that the railroad will be as much to blame for a strike as the men.

What the effect upon public opinion will be when all business is tied up is, of course, only problematical, but whatever that opinion is, it will undoubtedly have a large influence upon the manner in which the strike is settled. The side that wins will be the one with public sympathy on that side.

EUGENICS IN MARRIAGE.

THE LAW requiring that the man in Oregon who would wed must present a certificate of physical cleanliness has been the subject of much comment recently.

Probably no one will dispute that the law is a good one, were it enforceable; but it is not. Those who would circumvent the law have only to go across the border into Washington, where there is no such law. By this method many wedding fees are sent out of the state and county clerks suffer for license fees.

No doubt many who could pass the examination go across the line to be married just to get away from the nuisance of getting a medical examination or because they do not believe the state has any business butting into their love affairs, but, as a matter of fact, no law should be required to compel a man to show a clean bill of health. The girl who would marry might well require assurance that she is not to be made miserable because of the sins of the one who has won her heart, or, at least, her hand. She would be fully within her rights in wishing to be assured that she is not going to be an accessory to passing disease and misery on to a future generation.

No man who truly loves a girl should be offended because asked to make such assurances. When there are statistics to show that a large percentage—a tremendously large percentage—of the male of the species is in some way affected by sexual diseases, either through the sins of himself or his fathers, it is really passing strange that this all important thing, the cleanliness of the male party to a marriage, should have so long been given no consideration. It is passing strange that parents have never thought it necessary to be assured that their daughter, who has been kept clean from her maidenhood, is to wed one who has kept himself free from the contamination of sexual filth.

It is not likely that a girl would care to imply a doubt as to the physical fitness of one whom she had known a long time, with whose life she had been familiar for a long time, and whom she loved well enough to entrust with her body and soul, but a thing of this sort might well be the duty of a father who loves his daughters well enough to wish to see them made as happy as he has made their mother—or as happy as he should have made her.

The Sentinel is a stickler for modesty, as any know who have read its editorial columns, but there is a difference—a vast difference—between modesty and prudery, and prudery should not be allowed to interfere with our providing for the happiness of those we love, or with the happiness of those yet unborn whom we expect to love.

For ourselves we would be suspicious of one who would attempt to evade the eugenics law, now that it is on the statute books, but we can see no particular reason for discrimination against one sex except that by far the greater need for such a law applies to the male sex. We would be pretty well satisfied if there were no greater need for the law than that made necessary by the gentler sex.

WONDERS STILL CONTINUE.

BENTON County Courier: Editor Bede, editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, is supporting a democrat for office—and the U. S. sun rises and sets on Lane county as usual.

Any other newspaper could transgress a republican party dictum and I would not feel it a duty to give it free editorial advertising, for party ropes are weak strings in Oregon today.

But Bede jumping in with a sacrifice bid to advance a democratic base runner—well, I sure look for the quicksilver mines of Lane county to quit producing.

Bede has inherited republicanism in its worst form. He would no more scratch a ticket than a Kentuckian would pour water in his drink of whiskey. At an early age he was vaccinated against democracy and as a further precaution he crosses his fingers and pounds on wood every time he has to use the capital "D" on his type-writer.

Only a short time ago the democrats worked themselves into a wild frenzy because Justice Hughes would not say anything. Now they are working themselves into a still greater frenzy because he is saying too much. It is a dogged hard job for a republican to please the democrats.

SENTINEL RECOGNIZED IN NEW YORK CITY.

VERY seldom, we take it, does the editorial position of an Oregon country weekly become the cause of comment on the editorial page of a great New York daily. Therefore The Sentinel feels complimented by the following gentle roast which appeared in The Evening Post, New York, August 19:

"Is unbending partisanship to become obsolete? Here is the Cottage Grove, Ore., Sentinel, 'under all ordinary conditions,' as we rejoice to note, acknowledging itself to be a 'red hot, uncompromising partisan republican newspaper,' supporting a democrat. It admits that this is no sudden resolve: 'In the case of the election this fall of circuit court judges for this district, The Sentinel long ago determined that it would support at least one democrat for that position.' It has conscience enough to recognize, however, that 'for so unusual a thing as the support of a democrat for office The Sentinel must have good reasons.' These it professes to have:

"It is not good for the business of our courts to be continually making changes. When a man has served 18 years, has given eminent satisfaction, has not let politics nor personal affairs interfere with the performance of his honest duty, we believe it would be folly to make a change. Judge Hamilton fills all the qualifications which The Sentinel demands. * * *

Another reason why we particularly favor Judge Hamilton is because he believes in expediting the business of the courts. * * *

In addition to all this he is a pleasant man to meet, * * * not the least affected because of the honors that have been given him by the voters of this district."

"We have no doubt that the judge, though a democrat, is all that our Oregon contemporary says he is, but we would point out the dangerous precedent set by its present deviation from the straight and narrow way. The reason it assigns for supporting one judge regardless of the ticket he is on could be alleged as reasons for selecting all judges and even non-judicial officers as blindly. The Sentinel should reflect upon the implications of its act, and not be deceived by the 'Good for you, Bede,' of the non-partisan Oregon Voter."

REFUSING \$100,000.

IN THESE days when wealth lends respectability, or is generally conceded to attach a certain amount of that generally desired commodity, it is decidedly unusual to hear of anyone refusing such a sum as \$100,000 when that amount is offered him for his services.

Yet that is exactly what Charles E. Hughes did. And he didn't wait until he was a candidate for president. He did this while he was a justice of the supreme court and years before he was even mentioned for president.

Here are the facts:

When Joseph Pulitzer, the great New York publisher, wrote his will he looked over the entire field of America for trustees who would administer fairly, judiciously and expertly the great property which he planned to bequeath in trust to his heirs. He named Charles Evans Hughes, then a member of the United States supreme court, and fixed \$100,000 as his compensation.

Justice Hughes declined the commission and the fee. So great an amount for an easy job was no temptation to a man who had high ideals for himself as a judge and for others and who lived up to them.

Such a man is the nominee of the republican party for president.

WILSON ASKS LAWS TO PREVENT STRIKE

Railroads Reject Proposal and Men Order Tie-up for September 4.

Washington.—President Wilson laid the railway strike situation before congress Tuesday afternoon in an address to both houses assembled in joint session. The president told congress of his efforts to bring the railroad managers and the men into some sort of agreement, and saying he was powerless to do more, he asked congress to enact legislation to deal with the situation.

Pointing out the distress and hardships which a nation wide strike would bring upon the country, the president asked congress to empower him to draft into the service of the United States the very managers and men who have been unable to adjust their differences so that the government may operate the railroads in case of military necessity.

Direct negotiations between the railroad executives and employees through President Wilson were practically closed when the executives refused to accede to a proposal made to them by Mr. Wilson and presented to him a statement of their position containing another argument for arbitration.

Strike Ordered for September 4.

While President Wilson was announcing that he would lay the railway strike situation before congress the brotherhood leaders rejected the latest proposition of the committee of railroad presidents and actually ordered the strike to begin at 7 a. m. Labor day unless a settlement satisfactory to them is reached in the meantime.

The labor leaders admitted they took their action in the belief that some means was being sought to prevent the strike actually being called. By their action they think they have anticipated any legal processes which might be brought against them.

Wilson Asks Laws to Prevent Strike

In his address to congress, Wilson proposed that it "enlarge the membership of the interstate commerce commission to equip it to deal with larger situations; second, that at eight-hour day be established for all trainmen in interstate commerce; third, that a commission investigate the effect of the eight-hour day; fourth, that the interstate commerce commission consider the increased cost of the eight-hour day in making rates, and fifth, amend the mediation law to prevent strikes or lockouts while industrial disputes are being investigated. The sixth proposal was that the president be empowered to operate railways in case of military necessity. How these recommendations are to be carried out, President Wilson left entirely in the hands of congress.

TURKISH ADVANCE STOPPED

Initiative Is Regained by Czar's Caucasian Army.

Petrograd, via London.—The Turkish attempt to encircle the left flank of the Russian-Caucasian army appears to have received a crushing blow between the troops of Grand Duke Nicholas in the region of Lake Van. The Turkish encircling scheme, aimed at regaining Erzerum and thus nullifying all the grand duke's victories in Turkish Armenia, appeared about to succeed, but the Russian occupation of Mush and re-establishment of Russian positions west of Lake Van apparently have made hopeless the Turkish efforts.

The initiative now appears again to be with the Russians at all important points in Asia Minor, and now that the Turkish offensive on the left flank has been stopped, Grand Duke Nicholas can continue his march toward Asia Minor.

Drive Started by Roumanians.

London.—Desperate fighting on the border between Roumania and Hungary is reported in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berne, Switzerland. The Roumanians, the message says, are making furious efforts to capture the important mountain passes.

Big Cement Suit Is Filed.

Portland, Or.—Suit for \$1,500,000 against an alleged cement combine seeking absolute control or the ruin of the Oregon Portland Cement company, of Oswego, was filed in the federal court by Aman Moore, largest individual stockholder, vice-president and treasurer, in the name of the company.

Auto Bandits Get \$13,000 From Banks.

Danville, Ill.—Six robbers blew the safes in two banks at Homer, Ill., near here and escaped in an automobile with loot estimated at \$13,000.

New York.—The number of new cases of infantile paralysis continues to decrease.
