FARMERS SHOULD LOOK FOR SEED IN CLOVER

Agriculturalist Finds Fields That Will Not Warrant Threshing.

Farmers who expect to thresh clover this fall should examine the blossoms in their fields immediately to ascertain whether or not the heads contain seed. This is the opinion of N. S. Robb, Lane county agricultural agent.

Mr. Robb has visited a number of fields and has found that there is not enough seed in the blossoms to justify threshing and if the growers allow the clover to stand long enough to ripen there will be considerable loss. The seed that would be obtained would be of little value, says Mr. Robb, while if the fields are cut earlier they will be of use for feeding purposes.

Most of Flax Is Cut.

Eighty per cent of the Lane county flax crop has been cut, and about half of it has been taken to the plant at Eugene, according to Manager George Quayle, of the Eugene chamber of commerce, under whose auspices the flax experiment has been conducted. The retting tanks have already been filled with a charge of the straw and this will soon be ready to put through the different machines.

Some of the flax straw that has been brought in is too short to make a standard linen fiber and accordingly is being made into tow. Flax for this purpose is spread out on the grass to be retted by the dew.
