Would Take Four Boxes of Fruit to Poison

C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, takes exception to the statement in a Eugene paper that a Eugene woman was poisoned from eating a peach. He says peaches are not sprayed with poison spray and that the Eugene lady must have eaten something else.

"No poison spray is used on peaches," said the inspector, "and even though the peaches were sprayed with the arsenate of lead spray that is used on apples, one would have to eat about four boxes of the fruit to feel any effects of the poison, and probably by that time would not be worrying much about poison."

"Of all the millions of barrels of apples that have been sprayed with this material," continued the inspector, "I have yet to find anyone who has been poisoned by eating the fruit."

MILLS ARE CLOSING FOR LACK OF CARS

The car shortage on the Southern Pacific lines north of Ashland amounts this morning to 1200, according to advices from Salem.

The conditions resulting from the inability of this company to meet orders for cars are becoming more serious each succeeding 24 hours and this is evidenced by telegrams coming to the public service commission.

The following telegram was received from the Ewans Box company at Klamath Falls:

"Have received but four cars since Thursday noon and no promise of any today. We are needing five to seven cars every day. Unless we can get cars quick and continuously our business will be forced into the hands of a receiver. During the past 60 days have been unable to secure cars of any consequence without your assistance, hence are telegraphing you often."

A telegram from the Summit Mill company, of Summit, says:

"Mill closed. No cars. Must have cars before we can turn a wheel."

These are but two of several mills and manufacturing establishments that have notified the commission that a close down, with all the inconveniences and suffering resultant therefrom, is inevitable if cars are not forthcoming soon.

The commission is still continuing its policy of urging the railroad company to take immediate action looking to the relief of the situation. It has not as yet taken formal action against the railroad company. Whether or not it will be required to do so the developments of the next few days will determine.
