FADS AND FANCIES

A contributor writes: I have never seen in any home but my own the comfort and blanket protectors that keep even the lightest colored bedding fresh and dainty. I make these protectors of a width of lawn or soft long cloth, and button them on all corners and blankets. They are easily removed to be washed and my pretty silk comforts are kept looking like new, even after six years of use.

There is an old method of washing flannels and woollens which has been consecrated for ages and is adopted in nearly all households as the only right way. The flannels, after being carefully washed in warm suds, are rinsed out in perfectly clear water. Now if instead of rinsing in clear water the flannels are rinsed in a much weaker solution of suds than the one in which they are washed, they will be softer, more supple and in every way more like their original selves than after a rinsing in

clear water. Sometimes substitute a little borax and washing soda for suds in washing and rinsing flannels—using, of course, a much weaker solution for the rinsing.

The treatment of a flying bird in a new bureau scarf suggests possibilities for other pieces of needlework. The scarf is worked in blue and so is the bird. The entire outline of the bird is made of small eyelets, varying in size with the outline of the various parts of its body. The entire bird is then filled in with even running stitches of the blue. This combination gives the effect of solid work, but with the exception of the eyelets it is not difficult. And everyone will remember that the blue bird is the emblem of happiness, an emblem it is well to have ever before us.

TESTED RECIPES

Pimento Potatoes—For potatoes that are both delicious and "different," the following recipe is recommended: Peel and cut the potatoes into cubes and boil in salted water until almost tender, then drain. Melt two tablespoonsful of butter in a saucepan, add one heaping tablespoonful of flour and, when well blended, add gradually a cupful and a half of milk. Stir constantly until the sauce thickens and boils, season with salt and celery salt to taste, and add two tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley, one tablespoonful of minced pimiento and the cooked potatoes. Turn into the upper part of the double boiler and let cook over hot water until the potatoes are tender but not soft. Serve in a heated vegetable dish.

Blackberry Flummery—Here is an excellent as well as unique dessert: Place in a granite saucepan one pint water and simmer for ten minutes. Moisten two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with a little cold water; mix into the boiling berries, and stir constantly until the mixture is well thickened and it has boiled for several minutes. Sweeten to taste, add the well beaten yolks of two eggs, cook for a moment longer and remove from the fire. Cool slightly, flavor with a few drops of lemon juice and mix in the stiffly whipped egg whites. Turn into a mold that has been rinsed with cold water, chill on the ice and serve unmolded, accompanied by thick cream.

Asks for Divorce.

After 37 years of married life, Mrs. Josephine M. Hendry, of this county, seeks a divorce from her husband, Alexander Hendry. She charges cruel and inhuman treatment as alleged grounds for a legal separation.

In her complaint filed yesterday, Mrs. Hendry says that they were married at Chippewa Falls, Wis., May 4, 1879, and have seven children, all of whom are grown except one. Fourteen years ago, Mrs. Hendry alleges, her husband began a course of cruel and inhuman treatment. She says he absented himself from home for two years and when he returned at intervals he was cross and crabbed. She says he told her that he did not care for her.—Eugene Register.

principle of freedom and equality for which our fathers fought was at stake in the great war, when our whole country eagerly awaited the leadership of the president, Wilson dodged. He refused to take sides on the greatest moral issue of our time. He advised our people to be 'neutral even in thought,' undecided between right and wrong. While our friends abroad were fighting for the principles we held equally with them, he taught us that profits and ease were better than self-respect. President Wilson has done our nation the most serious injury that any leader can do to any people by making us flinch with him from a great moral decision.

Speaking of Hughes, Mr. Pinchot says in part: "Hughes is a man of his word. His record as governor of New York proves that. It shows him to be honest and fearless, and free from the domination of special interests and corrupt politicians. So far as the conservation policies are concerned, both what he said and what he did could hardly have been better. I am confident that under him these policies will be safe. He is a strong man who will dodge no moral issues, and he will give us an honest and efficient administration."

"As a progressive I believe in nationalism. So does Hughes. I am certain that under Hughes the progressive policies will fare better than under Wilson, and that the safety, honor and welfare of the country will be immeasurably super hands."

"I cannot vote for Wilson because I cannot trust him. He does not do what he says. Hughes does. Therefore my choice is Hughes, and I shall work and vote for him."

S. A. BUCK'S PROMISE DISCUSSED

Los Angeles Times Thinks Offer to Erect Shingle Mill Not Bluff.

Los Angeles Times: Recently there came to The Times, under a date line from Eugene, Ore., a dispatch stating that a large lumberman of that part of the web-foot state announced that he would erect a shingle mill, giving employment to about 50 men at the start. "If Charles E. Hughes is elected president."

This announcement was made by A. S. Buck, president of the Buck box factory in Eugene, and a stockholder in a number of northwest concerns manufacturing lumber products.

Now there's no doubt that this announcement will be construed differently by different persons and that the construction will depend upon the poli-

ties of the person entertaining the view. The democrat is very apt to say, "this is a bluff," and many of that political faith will be sincere in their expression of opinion.

But is it a bluff? We think not. Mr. Buck is a man of affairs and like most of his kind is evidently a republican. Why is it that nearly all men of big affairs belong to this particular party? It is not a matter of prejudice with them, but of solemn, sober conviction founded upon experience. They know the republican party is the friend of enterprise, encourages business and protects business. This protection does not come so much from different treatment of individual business men, but lies first upon the party's policy of maintaining the tariff on goods made in foreign countries sufficiently high to encourage American enterprise to go on in the hope of prospering.

Now here we can imagine someone rising up and saying that this may be so, so far as the big business is concerned and those who own it. But this is a very shortsighted view of the question, for the person who needs protection most against goods made in foreign countries is the wage earner in America and he is the one who benefits most by protection.

C. G. SCHOOL OPENS NEXT MONDAY

Superintendent Beattie Asks Cooperation of Parents in Raising Standard of Scholarship.

To the People of Cottage Grove School District: Next Monday, September 18, marks the opening of a new year in your grade and high schools. The activities of our schools should be of vital interest not only to the seven hundred boys, girls, young men and young women who make up our school population, but also to every other citizen of the community. For about six hours a day the schools are the workshops of our children who are the hope of our lives, not only in the perpetuation of the family, but in the continuation of the community life and civilization. Therefore, the school is, or ought to be, the greatest of all public enterprises.

If our young people of today are to become the business men and women, the home-makers and legislators of tomorrow, our schools must develop in them a type of citizenship that will perpetuate the integrity of the home, the community and the nation. To this end, you are urged to unite with the teachers this year in securing through our schools a higher standard of conduct and scholarship than ever has been reached.

Both patrons and pupils are urged to realize that going to school is a business. Some look upon school days as a preparation for life. School days are a PART of life—and a most vital part. In the more developed habits of mind and body that determine the character of present and future. To teach a pupil that he is merely preparing to live at the end of the eighth grade, or to lead young people to think that high school and college are only a preparation for life is erroneous. Let us teach the pupils that they are in the business of life and must now learn the habits of regularity, promptness, honesty and obedience to right and just requirements. Such habits will not diminish the pleasure of living, but will rather add much to the enjoyment of wholesome play and recreation.

In the school work of the year, parents and guardians are urged to follow the progress of their children by visiting the school, consulting with teachers and by carefully examining, signing and returning the report cards which will be given to the pupils at the end of every six weeks. All people interested in education are cordially invited to visit the schools during any session.

Opening at 9 a. m., with a noon intermission from 12 to 1 o'clock, the school day will follow the same hours as last year. Grade pupils who live east of the river will report for enrollment at east side school; those living west of the river will report at west side school. Pupils will be enrolled and secure their book lists on the opening day. School will convene for actual work Tuesday morning.

A great many books belonging to our school library are missing. Will you who had pupils or teachers in your homes last year kindly look through your books to see if by any chance some of those missing from the library may have been left there and forgotten? If you should find any, please return to the library as soon as possible.

High school pupils or others wishing to confer with me previous to the opening of school will find me in the office in the high school building from 8 to 11:30 a. m. on Friday and Saturday of this week.

Pension Increase Voted by Congress.
