## EXHIBITS ARE NOT SO NUMEROUS BUT BETTER

One Display at Grange Fair Contains One Hundred Kinds of Grains and Grasses.

Corn, Tomatoes, Green and Canned Fruit Attract the Attention of Those Interested in the Products of the Soil.

Willamette valley will not successfully produce corn and tomatoes, but Cottage Grove growers long ago disproved such statements.

A good display of corn was made by F. J. Helliwell, who never spent a night upon a farm until coming to Cottage Grove a couple of years ago. He has 48 acres that will more than provide feed for his 100 head of hogs.

The canned fruit displays gave some idea of what this section will do in that line. A display by Mrs. O. W. Blackmore contained 18 varieties of peaches; one by Mrs. G. W. McFarland contained 13 varieties of cherries and one

by Mrs. M. M. Wheeler contained 8 varieties of strawberries. The latter exhibitor had 30 other varieties of dried fruit and 10 varieties of dried fruit.

In the fancy work department an interesting exhibit was a blanket made by Mrs. J. Kile, who is now 85 years of age. In her younger years she spun the wool from which the blanket was made; the wool was then dyed and made into socks and after the socks were worn out she unraveled them and made the blanket. Another interesting exhibit in the same department was a quilt made by Mrs. L. H. Slagle in her eighty-second year.

A unique exhibit in the fancy department was a picture of the Hayden family, taken in Illinois, in which there were 300 persons, and then all were not present. It is the property of Mrs. Lora Finerty, a member of the family.

The exhibits in the industrial department were not nearly as extensive as last year but those that were on display were good.
