VOTE COMPARISON GIVES HUGHES MAJORITY

If Republicans Make No Gains Over 1914 Election Is Theirs Easily.

Counting the Progressive Votes of Two Years Ago and Figuring Natural Extra Votes of Presidential Year It Is a Landslide.

1914. The margin is too small for comfort on either side, and Indiana must remain as fighting territory until the votes are counted. The progressives, aided it is said by democratic funds, are maintaining an organization in that state; but competent observers believe that from 85 to 90 per cent of the ball moose will vote for Hughes and that the number who will support Wilson are negligible. Upon this basis Indiana should go for Hughes and Fairbanks by nearly 30,000.

The 70-30 division applied to Kansas would give that state to the republicans by the following figures: republicans, 240,216; democrats, 218,162.

In Maine the result would be: republicans, 77,888; democrats, 66,971.

In Nebraska the figures should show: republicans, 114,376; democrats, 113,820. This is another hairline of demarcation, but there is no bull moose ticket in Nebraska this year, and while the contest will be a hard one, the indications are that Hughes will carry the state.

The same division of the progressive vote in Ohio would produce figures for 1916 in this wise: republicans, 511,038; democrats, 498,653.

It is, therefore, a fair assumption that, in addition to retaining the states which disclosed a clear republican plurality in 1914, and which assume a majority of the electoral college, the republican ticket will this year gain Kansas, Maine and Ohio without question and secure for Hughes and Fairbanks a total of 326 out of the 531 votes in the electoral college, with more than a fighting chance to add the 23 votes of Indiana and Nebraska to that number, making 349, or a majority of 167.

[Note—Since the above figures were compiled, the Maine state election has been held, and it is interesting to note that the Pine Tree state went republican by almost the figures used above. It is reasonable to believe that the republican vote will increase at the national election.]

SAYS WE ARE TOO AFRAID OTHERS WILL SHIRK

Contributor Believes He Has Put Finger on Cause of Cannery Failure.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Sept. 11.—(To the Editor.)—I have been much interested in the several letters that have been printed in The Sentinel in regard to the Cottage Grove cannery. OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

Oregon's state fair will open at Salem Monday.

The fifth annual Columbia county fair opened at St. Helens Wednesday. Albany college began its 51st year as an educational institution Monday. The fifth annual Polk county fair is being held in Dallas, beginning Tuesday.

Monday witnessed the beginning of the 25th year of work of Pacific college at Newberg.

The fruit and vegetable-preserving industries of The Dalles are badly hampered by the lack of labor.

At the end of the first week the registration in the Oregon normal school at Monmouth reached 285.

During the week ending September 14 there were 233 industrial accidents in the state, none of which was fatal.

A walnut tree in the yard of the residence of L. E. Blain, an Albany merchant, will probably produce 15 bushels of nuts this year.

A lookout station, similar to that on the summit of Mount Hood, is contemplated for Mount Jefferson by the United States forest service.

Jackson county's sixth annual fair opened at Medford with a free barbecue conducted by local merchants and attended by 3000 persons.

Headed by their own band, 2000 citizens of Ashland went to Medford in a special train to celebrate Ashland day at the Jackson county fair.

Florists in Oregon do more than \$1,000,000 worth of business annually, according to data collected by O. P. Hoff, state labor commissioner.

Construction of six auxiliary schooners for Norwegian interests, involving \$1,500,000, is to be undertaken by the Heath Shipbuilding company, of Portland.

To celebrate the return to popularity of the once-despised evergreen blackberry, Sweet Home held an evergreen blackberry fair on September 20.

The management of the Benton county fair has announced the postponement of the fair until Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 21, 22 and 23.

The Albany postoffice will hereafter be the supply distributing station for all second and third-class postoffices in Marion, Polk, Linn, Benton and Lincoln counties.

Governor Withycombe last week granted four conditional pardons and 25 paroles to penitentiary inmates in accordance with the recommendation of the parole board.

A new industry has developed in Linn county from what a few years ago was becoming a great pest, in the picking of evergreen blackberries for the Brownsville cannery.

Baker county broke the season's price record at Kansas City when a carload of 1430-pound steers, belonging to F. C. Oxman, of Durkee, was sold at 10 cents a pound.

Construction work on the north jetty at the mouth of the Siuslaw river was finished last week, and construction machinery has been transferred across the river to the south jetty.

Bennett Thompson, who was convicted at Hillsboro of the murder of Mrs. Helen Jennings on the Gore ranch last May, was sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge Bagley.

To plan reforestation work in that section of the state, Julius F. Kummell, of the United States forestry office in Portland, is now on a tour of inspection in Linn and Marion counties.

The annual fall shipment of beef from Klamath county has started in earnest, and from now on until winter thousands of head of beef stock will be sent to the Portland, San Francisco and Sacramento markets.

Twelve girls, inmates of the state industrial school at Salem, escaped from the institution. The girls who escaped, according to the police, dashed away from the school while seated on the porch at dinner time.

Willis C. Hawley, representative in congress from the first district, has returned to his home in Salem from Washington, D. C., and established headquarters preparatory to conducting his campaign for re-election.

The largest real estate deal in many months was consummated at Albany, when Theodore Stalp purchased the E. E. Upmeyer ranch, nine miles east of Harrisburg, for \$70,000. The tract transferred contains 3223 acres.

The stock department of the coming Central Willamette Valley exposition, to be held at Albany in connection with the harvest festival October 12, 13 and 14, will be the biggest held in the state outside of the state fair.

A special deputy sheriff has been appointed at Prairie City who will examine all shipments of liquor shipped into the county. It has been alleged that the law is being violated and that whisky and beer is being imported labeled as beer.

ALLIES CONTINUE STEADY ADVANCE

Chaulnes and Peronne Are Imperiled by Foch's Men, and Salient is Eliminated.

London.—The British and French, striking simultaneously north and south of the Somme, have further won important successes. Haig's troops took another giant step forward in their drive against Bapaume, while Foch extended his positions between Chaulnes and Peronne, greatly increasing the menace to both these strongholds.

In their advance north of the Somme the British took an important step in their movement toward the encirclement of Thiepval, obliterating the salient that protruded into their lines between that place and Courcellette, and brought their front to within less than a mile of Grandcourt and the Albert-Bapaume road. By capturing Mouquet farm work and the Danube trench, Haig has eliminated the greatest obstacles toward a direct northeast advance on Bapaume by the British.

The British guns are now bombarding Grandcourt, while Bapaume itself is almost in range of the heavy artillery.

The success of the French south of the Somme likewise wipes out a dangerous salient and brings their right wing nearer the point of the south from which the flank move on Peronne must be begun. Swiftly the French are clearing the whole sector south and southwest of Peronne and bringing nearer the isolation of that stronghold.

The allied attack in Picardy is daily growing in momentum. The British advance is exhibiting such power that it is no longer necessitating constant pauses for the consolidation of ground gained.

SERBIANS ADVANCE IN MACEDONIA

London.—A further advance for the Serbians on the western end of the Macedonian front is reported in a dispatch sent out under a Saloniki date by the Exchange Telegraph company. It says the first and second line trenches of the Bulgarians at Kalmakalan have been taken by the Serbians, who have crossed the Broda river. Heavy fighting continues on the further bank of the river.

The Serbians are reported to have taken four field guns and eight machine guns, bringing up to 36 the number of guns captured. A large number of prisoners also are said to have fallen into the hands of the Serbians.

The dispatch also reports that French troops on the allied left wing have captured the station at Florina. Heavy fighting continues.

TEUTONS WIN BIG BATTLE

Mackensen Drives Russians and Roumanians Back 60 Miles in Roumania

Berlin.—Russian and Roumanian troops are being driven back upon the river Danube in southeastern Roumania in the most disastrous defeat suffered by an allied army since the Serbians were crushed a year ago.

The Roumanian army is hastily falling back upon the line running through Czernavoda and Midzidiah to Constanza on the Black Sea, a retreat at some places of more than 60 miles, said a dispatch to the Cologne Volks Zeitung.

The Russo-Roumanian center has been driven back more than 30 miles, said a dispatch from German headquarters. The enemy was caught in a deep pocket at Dobric and abandoned large quantities of booty in a hasty retreat.

Field Marshal Mackensen, who directed the Teutonic steam roller drive through Serbia, is commanding the German, Turkish and Bulgarian armies now advancing into Roumania.

British Use Armored Cars Effectively.

British Front in France.—The main theme of talk in the British army is the wonderful work of the new armored cars, used for the first time when the British smashed the German's third line of defense.

Evidently their building was a close secret, the first the Germans knowing of their existence being when dawn came and they trundled across craters, trenches and tree stumps on to the German's second and third line defenses. Many battalions, following in their wake had nothing more to do than harvesters gathering sheaves as they follow the reaper and binder.

Bulgars Retreating.

Saloniki.—Victorious Serbians troops are driving the defeated Bulgars in disorderly retreat back toward the Serbo-Greek frontier in the direction of the Serb town of Monastir, said a Serbian official statement issued here.
