FADS AND FANCIES

In grating cheese you will find it easier to press it through a large sieve instead of rubbing on the grater. There is little or no waste this way and a great deal of time is saved.

A contributor offers these two suggestions:

I have found it quite a saving to cut off the feet of worn-out stockings, cut open the uppers and sew the two into an approximately square piece. I use cotton, lisle and silk stockings for dust-ers, furniture and floor polishers, and

bing and polishing cloths. They do not fray, hence do not require the labor of hemming, and they are most durable and easily kept clean.

Also, when making the gravy from roast of meat I have found that if I pour off part of the fat, add a cup of cold water, sift in a tablespoonful of dry flour and stir it while it cooks I can make smooth brown gravy that never lumps and is far less work than making gravy in the usual way.

To keep wooden tables nice and white wash them with boiling water in which two tablespoonfuls of washing soda, a half pound of Fuller's earth and a liberal quantity of soap have been dissolved.
