SAYS CHAMBERLAIN DID NOT STATE FACTS

G. W. Casady, Life-long Democrat, Is to Vote for Hughes Because of Administration's Blunders

The statement of Senator Chamberlain in a speech at Roseburg last Thursday night to the effect that repatriation was demanded and made to the families of those who were lost through violence in Mexico, was stoutly refuted by G. W. Casady, a farmer of Carson, Wash., whose stepson, E. L. Robinson, of El Paso, Tex., was last winter removed from a train at San Yabel and murdered along with others.
Mr. Casady says the heirs of the

murdered American have endeavored to obtain indemnity but have thus far received no satisfaction.

"When Senator Chamberlain says indemnity has been paid for the lives of the victims of the democratic administration's blunders he is not telling the truth," said Mr. Casady. "We have been fighting for the indemnity but have not been paid."

"Senator Chamberlain knows that the true condition of things in Mexico has been suppressed by the administration. The American people like to be bunced apparently, but there is a limit to everything."

"My stepson worked for seven years for the Casick Mining company prior to the time he was taken from the train and murdered. I cast my first vote for a democrat in 1884 when Cleveland ran against James G. Blaine and have never voted for a republican in more than 30 years, but Charles Evans Hughes gets my support this year because I have first-hand knowledge of the blunders of the administration in Mexico."
