"UNCLE JIM" SHORTRIDGE, PIONEER OF 1857, DIES EARLY THIS MORNING

Immediate Cause of Death Was Rheumatism.—Was Among Best Known of Early Residents and Life Had Been a Most Active One



The Late J. H. Shortridge and His Wife

James H. Shortridge, one of the best known and most highly respected pioneers of Lane county, died at 12 o'clock last night, following a short illness. Immediate cause of death was sciatic rheumatism. Mr. Shortridge had undergone an operation for rupture a week or so ago, but it is thought this did not contribute materially to his death.

Mr. Shortridge was one of the few survivors of the earliest pioneers of the Cottage Grove country, coming here in 1851 when there was little else here but Indians and varmints. He took a donation claim six miles south of here, upon which he resided until retiring in 1906. He was the first white child born in Lafayette, Tippecanoe county, Indiana. He was married March 13, 1853, at Santiam City, Marion county, to Amelia S. Adams.

The life of Mr. Shortridge was an active one. During the time he was operating his farm he served 40 years as head of the blacksmith shop for the old Oregon & California stage line, was road supervisor of a district as large as a good-sized county, was a member of the school board, was senior deacon in the Christian church and also special deputy sheriff. He also served several years as secretary of the Union league and was color sergeant of the Coast Fork rangers, E troop of the state militia.

Mr. Shortridge was a grand-nephew of Daniel Boone. He was aged 85 years, 3 months and 8 days and had been a reader of The Oregonian since it was first issued. He remembered paying 26¢ a year for the weekly edition.

The funeral will be held at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the Christian church.

Surviving relatives are the wife and the following children: Boone of this city; Mrs. J. W. Harris, of Eugene; Mrs. J. J. Weeden, of this city, and Mrs. Olive Lacey, of Portland.

A. L. ZACHARIAS IS THOUGHT TO BE SUICIDE

Dispatch from Bend Tells of Unexpected Absence from Home After Drawing Money

Bend, Ore., Oct. 25.—A. L. Zacharias, who came to Bend from Portland last summer, engaging in the life insurance business here, has been missing since last Saturday. His wife fears that he may have made away with himself.

The actions of the missing man preceding his disappearance indicate that he fully premeditated his act. After drawing his pay at one of the factories, where he had worked for a few weeks, he went to Hedmond and with the aid of an attorney there transferred his property to his wife. He has not been seen since.

Mr. Zacharias was well known here, where he was a resident for several years, being a teacher in the schools several years until resigning last summer. He went from here to Lebanon, where he was interested in a farm, went from there to Portland and from there to Bend. He came here from the canal zone about six years ago and bought a farm south of here, later trading that for city property. He was an energetic man and was active in school affairs and in the Christian church.
