Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)

MONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week . . . students enrolled 785, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon . . . how to care for large student body a problem . . . 800 being crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 550. Galleries filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform. New boarding houses completed, additions to rooming houses built and tents used. One hundred girls sleep on upper floor of school.

The official school report gives 150 grade pupils in Monmouth, for teacher practice.

Read what those you have elected to handle the affairs of your state and who are thoroughly informed regarding school conditions in Oregon have to say concerning measure 308 on the ballot at the coming election:

"Oregon is unquestionably in need of more normal school work and Pendleton is the logical place for a school of this class in Eastern Oregon."

By P. L. Campbell, President of the University of Oregon:

"At least one additional Normal School is urgently needed in Oregon."

"Since the people of Pendleton are initiating a measure for the establishment of a Normal School at that place, it will give me pleasure to support this measure."

By J. H. Ackerman, President Oregon Normal School, at Monmouth:

"A careful analysis of the situation will convince any one that Oregon needs a Normal School in Eastern Oregon and Pendleton fills all the government requirements."

By the County School Superintendents of Oregon:

"Resolved, that it is the sense of the County School Superintendents of the State of Oregon, in convention assembled, that the best interests of the schools of the State demand increased facilities for the training of teachers, and that we, therefore, endorse the initiative measure to establish a Normal School at Pendleton."

By Mrs. Charles H. Castner, President of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs:

"I most heartily endorse the location of said Normal School at Pendleton."

Prof. Robert C. French, Former President of the Normal School Located at Weston:

"An immediate establishment of such a school at some central point such as Pendleton would prove a great asset to the State of Oregon."

B. F. Mulkey, Ex-President Southern Oregon Normal School:

"I shall support the location of an Eastern Oregon Normal School at Pendleton."

State Board of Regents of Oregon Normal School declares that "the necessity for additional Normal school facilities in Oregon is apparent."

MACKENSEN FORCES ENEMIES TO RETIRE

Huge Force of Germans, Bulgars and Turks Hammers Russo-Roumanians.

London.—Under command of Field Marshal Mackensen, who directed the Teutonic steam roller through Serbia, a huge force of Germans, Bulgars and Turks is striking heavy hammer blows against the Russo-Roumanian line.

The Roumanian fort of Constanza has been captured by the Germans, the Berlin war office announces.

On practically the entire Dobrudja front, the Russians and Roumanians have given way under the first shock of this mighty offensive, official dispatches indicate.

Mackensen's left wing has captured the town of Rasovo, on the Danube. Rasovo is only eight miles south of Cernavoda, and the only bridge over the Danube by which the retreating Russo-Roumanians can withdraw to old Roumania.

The Teutonic center has captured the railway junction of support of the Russo-Roumanian line. The right wing has swept on through Constanza in pursuit of the retreating Roumanians, pursuing cavalry having reached the region of Caramurat.

While Mackensen was winning his victory in Dobrudja, the resumption of the offensive in Transylvania with the purpose of crushing Roumania between eastern and western armies has met with some success, Berlin reports.

AUSTRIAN PREMIER IS ASSASSINATED

Vienna.—The Austrian premier, Count Stuergh who was assassinated while at dinner by Ludwig Adler, publisher, was shot three times. Count Stuergh was dining at a hotel when the publisher attacked him. Three shots were fired, all of which took effect, the premier dying instantly.

The assassination was purely political and was induced by his refusal to convene parliament, according to the admissions of Dr. Friedrich Adler, his assassin, shortly after his arrest.

Dr. Adler is an eccentric and super-radical Socialist, sometimes known as "the Liebknecht of Austria."

Dr. Adler's arrest was not accomplished without the wounding of two men who leaped at him after he had fired on Count Stuergh and before Austrian and German officers overpowered him.

The wounded men are Baron Aehrenthal, brother of the late foreign minister, and the head waiter of the hotel in which the shooting occurred.

BRITISH TAKE TRENCHES

Sweep of 5000 Yards on Somme Front is Success:

London.—Advancing on a line of 5000 yards between the Schwaben redoubt and Le Sars, on the Somme front in France, the British troops have pushed their line forward from 300 to 500 yards says the official statement from general headquarters in France. The British captured Staff and Regina trenches and took several hundred prisoners.

Previous to the attack an attempted offensive on the part of the Germans was repulsed by the British.

Three strong attacks against Sully-Sailles, on the Somme front, failed, according to the bulletin issued by the French war office, the Germans sustaining heavy losses. They made similar attempts between Blaches and La Maisonnette and were generally repulsed.

American Exports Set Record.

Washington.—American exports made a new record during September, when \$512,847,957 worth of goods was sent abroad. American export trade is approaching the \$5,000,000,000 mark. The total of exports of the 12 months ending with September was \$4,971,945,883, exceeding that of the same period the year before by \$1,794,181,699.

Infantile Paralysis Mystery.

Milwaukee.—The American Association for Study and Prevention of Infant Mortality is of the opinion that the medical profession so far is unable to cope with infantile paralysis and that its origin and method of contagion virtually is unknown.

Noted French Generals Wounded.

Paris.—Two of the best known French generals, Brigadier-General Marchand, of Fashoda fame, and General Sainte Claire Deville, have been wounded in battle.

Germany Protests to Norway.

Christiania, via London.—The German minister has presented to the Norwegian government a note protesting against Norway's embargo on the submarines of belligerent countries.

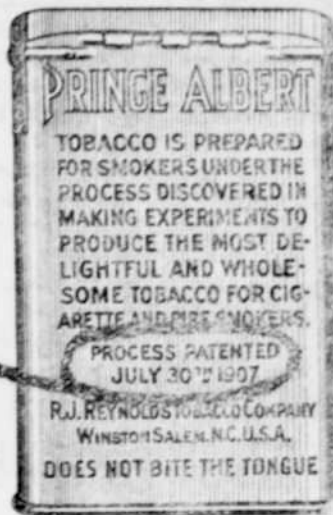
