TARIFF NEVER OUT OF POLITICS, HAWLEY

(Continued from first page)

continental railroads which have been able to maintain higher rates than they would have been able to maintain had the democrats kept their promise.

The claim that we have been kept out of war was riddled with hot shot. "Only blundering diplomacy could have possibly got us into war," the speaker said, "and even at that European nations have had to protest that we were butting in. No man could get us into war or keep us out of war. Public sentiment regulates that and we are a peace loving nation. The president can not declare war. Congress must do that."

The Mexican situation was explained in a manner that showed that if we had wanted to go to war with Mexico we could not have acted the part better.

"Why have we no right in Mexico?" the speaker asked. "We have the same treaty agreements with Mexico that we have with England, with Germany, with France, and with every other civilized country on the globe. Have we no right in England? Have we no right in France? Have we no right in Canada? The dog who puts his tail between his legs and runs gets licked the oftenest."

"Americans have gone into Mexico and have improved conditions there. They have gone into every kind of business and have raised the wages of the peon from 30 cents to \$1.50 a day. If we had abided by the proclamation of neutrality issued by President Taft and continued the embargo on arms we would have got into no trouble with Mexico. We did not need to go to war with Mexico. I do not claim that it was necessary to go to war with Mexico. American life was pretty safe there as long as we preserved our neutrality and did not intermeddle, but when we accused Huerta of murder and sent John Lind there to inform him that we did not like him and wanted him to resign, we intermeddled and took upon ourselves the responsibility for conditions in Mexico. When we demanded that Huerta salute the flag as an apology but refused to accept the apology by returning the salute we treated Mexico as we would not treat a power able to defend itself. We treated Mexico as we would not allow another nation to treat us. When our soldiers attacked Vera Cruz, a peaceful city with which we were not at war, when we killed and wounded hundreds of the citizens of Vera Cruz who had done us no wrong, with whom we had no trouble, we either made war on Vera Cruz or we committed murder. We would not have dared treat any other nation as we treated Mexico. Nineteen of our boys were killed in the attack upon Vera Cruz and 100 wounded. Have we been kept out of war? If that is peace, may God forever deliver us from war."

"When we saw we could eliminate Huerta in no other way, the administration tried to put him out of business by putting Villa into business. What is Villa's business? He has killed hundreds of Americans and has treated our girls and women worse than death. He is a murderer, he is a convict, he is a horse thief, he is guilty of every crime on the calendar, and the democratic administration lifted the embargo upon arms so that Villa could get them and murder the followers of Huerta. We shed tears over Belgium. Let's raise our hands to heaven for forgiveness for what we have allowed to be done in Mexico. If the time has come when we no longer protest at the murder of men and boys, and when we no longer hear appeals of outraged womanhood with her white hands raised to heaven, let us no longer boast of American chivalry."

"Every year of the three years of the democratic administration has made things worse in Mexico. Can we stand four years more?"

The speaker closed with a glowing tribute to Charles Evans Hughes.

Points made by Congressman Hawley were heartily applauded.

A high school quartet from Eugene, rendered two songs before the audience. The speaker was introduced by Dr. D. L. Woods.
