HUGHES AND WILSON RUN NECK AND NECK

Straw Ballot Last Night Gave Both Presidential Candidates Equal Number of Votes.

As far as the straw ballot at the Modern Pharmacy is concerned Cottage Grove seems to be pretty equally divided between Hughes and Wilson. The bulletin posted last night and which will remain up until 4 o'clock this afternoon, gives Hughes 82 and Wilson 69, but during the day both sides did quite a little hustling for votes and at 5:45 Hughes and Wilson each had 134 votes. At 7 o'clock the vote was again even, being 141 to 141.

In the nation-wide straw vote collected by the 8000 Rexall stores, the bulletin posted yesterday gave Hughes one vote the best of it in the electoral college, the standing being 266 to 265. The popular vote stands 107,288 for Wilson, to 80,519 for Hughes. This difference between the popular vote and the vote in the electoral college is accounted for by the fact that the largest votes are from southern states that give a unanimous democratic vote, while there is but a small vote from many states favoring Hughes.

The states are divided as follows: Hughes: Arizona, California, Connecticut, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin. Wilson: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming.

That this vote will switch back and forth is evidenced by the fact that Hughes gained some 40 electoral votes over the day before.

COTTAGE GROVE WILL GO FOR HUGHES STRONG

Conservative Estimate Places Hughes' Majority at 150 Out of Total of Probable 700 Votes.

The nearer it gets to election day the more certain it becomes that Cottage Grove will give Hughes a substantial majority. Four years ago Cottage Grove was one of two or three precincts in the county giving Taft a plurality. With progressives and republicans united, there is no question as to the result. There probably will be more than 700 votes cast and a conservative estimate would give Hughes a majority of 150 or more.

extended credit in time of need to people who now ride around the country in automobiles while the bills remain unpaid and nothing but an action at law will collect them?

I wonder again if these same people, when they happen to meet you on the highway, curse themselves for having such luck as to meet you, as their looks always bespeak guilt? And I wonder again if they ever experience a feeling of remorse when they are comfortably seated on their easy cushions on a good stretch of highway, enjoying all there is for a being in the world—if they ever think of the long-standing debts they owe and refuse to pay for no reason known to any but themselves? And I wonder again how they would feel if their names should happen to be printed in their home paper, where all their friends could see how they stand from an honest view, and to show how they abuse merchants who accommodated them when in need? But such people are entirely devoid of any sense of remorse, and why think of such things?

As I write this I refer to one of my old lodgers and find two of such people on their unpaid bills since January 1, 1910. Would you think of calling them undesirable citizens, or is that too harsh?

But I suppose they think their accounts are now paid, as they both refuse to speak to me now, unless I get them in a corner and make them speak, and I have to keep a sharp watch out down the street, for they never will meet me if they happen to see me coming toward them. But I do not wonder, as I really think they should avoid me, as they well know I furnished them medicine when they were sick and needed it.
