A NATION'S DUTY.

THE United States is a great peace-loving nation.

Is that the christian thing to do? Will that answer be accepted when we stand before the judgment seat?

Rather doesn't our christianity make

it our duty to put an end to unchristian acts when it is easily within our power to do so?

Rather doesn't our love for peace make it our duty to give peace to a bandit-overrun neighbor?

Rather doesn't our abhorrence of brutality make it our duty to put a stop to the brutality and savagery exhibited by the bandit savages of our southern neighbor?

Rather doesn't our respect for womanly virtue make it our duty to punish those who insult women in public and strip them of their clothes while traveling in public?

Rather doesn't our love of civility make it our duty to go to the rescue of the outraged women who extend their white hands towards us in an appeal for succor?

Can, red-blooded Americanism much longer withstand the call of humanity?

Can we live to ourselves, or have we a duty to perform in the affairs of the world?

These are some questions that require decisive answers, and require those answers soon.

The Sentinel predicts that the call of humanity, the call of duty, will be heard, and that intervention in Mexico is but a matter of months, possibly of weeks.

GROWING.

PECULIARITY of man is his ability to adapt himself to circumstances.

Many have been reduced from wealth to comparative poverty and have lived happily.

Many have been raised from poverty to wealth and have filled the new position as well as the first.

Man grows quickly into new positions.

We have seen the blacksmith apprentice become chairman of the great wars and means committee of the United States congress.

We have seen the rail splitter become the greatest of presidents.

We have seen a hootblack become a great senator.

We have seen the country editor taken from his desk, made governor, and become a popular candidate for the presidency.

We have seen the country editor too bashful to accept the secretaryship of a local commercial club become a member of congress two years later.

Everywhere about us are men and women capable of filling high positions—men and women who probably never will fill them, but who would surprise their friends if responsibilities were thrown upon them.

Proof of this is found in the case of Mrs. E. B. Hanley, of Medford.

Six months ago her friends would have laughed incredulously if anyone had told them she would be the sensation of the late campaign.

She made a couple of short talks, one at the organization of a Hughes Alliance at Medford, another at the state Hughes Alliance meeting in Portland. Her remarks made such an impression that she was asked to take part in the campaign. She had never done anything of that sort before. She did not know that she could make a campaign speech, yet it is more than likely that to her remarkable success as a campaigner is due the majority given the republican standard bearer in Oregon.

It is true that many are ambitious to fill positions for which they have no qualifications. It is true that many have inflated ideas of their own abilities, but it is equally true that we unwittingly harbor in our midst those who would quickly grow into positions which they themselves have never dreamed of filling.

DEMOCRATIC PAPERS AMUSE.

IT IS RATHER amusing to note the way the democratic press goes after The Oregonian and smite it hip and thigh.

The Creswell Chronicle calls The Oregonian all kinds of names for printing an editorial on the morning after election in which it declared Hughes had been elected. After accusing The Oregonian of gross deception, The Chronicle says in part:

"The Oregonian did not know that Hughes had been elected. It was impossible for it or any other paper to know who was elected at the time the edition in which the above appeared was printed. That edition went to press not later than midnight and at that time if Wil-

son had lost every state in the Union The Oregonian was not in a position to know it. It was simply trying to back up what it had been preaching for months, and in its effort to do this it stopped over."

We doubt if The Chronicle could say anything of The Oregonian which that paper would not deserve, but what amuses us is that papers like The Chronicle overlook more flagrant misdeeds on the part of newspapers of their own political faith.

It might be said in passing that every democratic newspaper printed at the same time as the issue of The Oregonian to which The Chronicle refers, admitted the election of Hughes. New York democratic newspapers admitted the election of Hughes early Tuesday night. One New York democratic paper nearly put the English language out of business in the demand made upon the vocabulary for words to abuse the electorate of the nation for their lack of appreciation of the services of the great and good Woodrow.

But, of course, what was a heinous crime for The Oregonian (and we would not have that paper escape punishment for any of its many sins) was merely an excusable error in judgment on the part of democratic newspapers.

We doubt not that, as The Chronicle says, The Oregonian practiced deception in this campaign, as it has in others, but The Chronicle overlooks the fact that beside the dyed-in-the-wool democratic Oregon Journal, The Oregonian is a mere tyro at deception. Beside The Journal The Oregonian's efforts at deception are puny and childish, they are weak, faltering and inane.

Lambast The Oregonian all you wish, Brother Baxter, but you must at the same time throw the harpoon into The Journal and its up-state mimics.

The Oregonian did nothing in its usual approach of The Journal's organization of a gang to abuse and mistreat visitors to Portland and bring disgrace upon the fair name of our state.

How to the line, brother, and let the chips fall where they may.

If there is any one thing that the Benton County Courier does often and well, that is to disagree with anything said by The Cottage Grove Sentinel.

The fumes and spews around about the things The Sentinel says and would not agree with anything said by The Sentinel, even if it were clipped from a back number of The Courier. The Courier stopped over, however, in its most recent issue, running an editorial paragraph from The Sentinel as its own.

It will take The Courier some time to get this off its system.

MONASTIR IS TAKEN BY FRENCH FORCES

Serbian City Evacuated By Defenders as Position is Not Tenable.

Paris.—French troops captured from the German and Bulgarian forces the chief southern Serbian town of Monastir, according to an official announcement made by the French war department.

The capture of Monastir by General Sarrail's army in Macedonia is looked upon by entente military writers as of notable political importance, but opinion appears to be divided as to whether it will be followed by military developments of sweeping character.

After having been for months men without a country, the Serbians are again to establish their capital on native soil, at Monastir.

Monastir is situated at the bottom of a bowl surrounded on all sides by dominating heights. It was, therefore, tactically untenable, as the allied forces gained a footing on the rim of the bowl.

The allies are pressing the German-Bulgarian rear guard detachments to the north of Monastir, according to the official announcement, and Italian forces have repulsed a counter attack west of Monastir. French troops have occupied the village of Kroni.

TEUTONS CONTINUE GAINS IN ROUMANIA

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville.—The Austro-German campaign against the Roumanians and their Russian allies met with further successes, the war office announces. Near Campulung, the Roumanians, whose forces are demoralized, made attacks but were repulsed.

The statement follows: "Our operations against the Russi-Roumanian front are progressing according to our plans."

"Northwest of Campulung, the Roumanians are exhausting their units, which are of mixed and haphazard formation, in fruitless attacks."

"Front of Field Marshal von Mackensen—in Dobrudja and along the Danube, as far as the port of Oltena, east of Silistria, there has been artillery firing."

"The effects of General von Falkenhayn's unrelenting pressure on the outposts from Predeal, Torzburger and Rothenthurm passes now are making themselves felt in neighboring sectors—namely, in the northern Roumanian and Wallachian Carpathians."
