OUR GEORGE ADMITS REPUBLICANS WERE RIGHT.

TWO YEARS ago the voters of Oregon were informed by their president that the welfare of the nation and the carrying out of the policies of the administration depended almost entirely upon the return of Senator Chamberlain to Washington.

So we returned "Our George." During the recent campaign the republicans claimed that the foreign policy of the administration had caused the United States to be looked upon as a nation too proud to fight even for its honor. The republicans said that our peace-at-any-price policy had invited the insults of the greater bandits and had made Americans unprotected game for greater bullets while other foreigners were treated with respect.

Despite these charges, that siren-sounding phrase "He kept us out of war," won a reelection and "Our George" was one of the most ardent supporters of all the acts of the administration and he gave it as his opinion that nothing less than the disintegration of the universe would follow the defeat of the president.

But now that the election is over, now that there is no reason to tell anything but the truth, "Our George" endorses the things that were said by the republicans. Following is an excerpt from his recent address at the University of Oregon:

"The peace-at-any-price propaganda has nearly destroyed the patriotic spirit of this country. In a military sense, we are laughed at in the world over, not because we have no standing army, but because we have no trained men."

Of course "Our George" did not make any such remark as this during the campaign, because he knew that to have made it would have meant the defeat of the administration.

But if the statement is true now, it was true then—
And the people were flim-flammed.

In a few days the legislators will be at Salem serving the dear people at \$3.00 a day, while the smallest wage that may be paid a stenographer or clerk is \$5.00 a day.

WHO PAYS?

HERE is one thing that is theoretically wrong with Oregon's form of government. That is the authority given to the state to regulate county affairs.

Why should the state regulate the salaries a county shall pay its own officers with its own money? Why should the state be able to say to Lane county you shall pay your county commissioners \$3.00 a day, or \$5.00 a day, or any other amount a day?

The state has nothing to say about the hiring of deputies in the county offices; it has nothing to say about the salaries that should be paid these deputies. Why should it be able to tell us how much we should pay our county clerk or our county sheriff?

The state says Lane county shall have widows' pensions, school supervisors, a sealer of weights and measures, an inspector for this, that or something else; and we must have them—and pay for them with our own money.

It is easy for interested ones to work upon the legislature to adopt some piece of legislation where the legislature escapes responsibility for the expense thereby made necessary.

It may be necessary to the success of certain reforms that they be uniformly adopted throughout the state, but counties themselves are best able to set the salaries for their officials and to say whether or not they want widows' pensions, school supervisors and such things.

If the legislature deems certain expensive reforms necessary, it should also

provide the funds for carrying them into effect. The result would be that many things deemed necessary when the counties must pay for them would be found unnecessary when the state must pay.
