COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official Publication.)
Nov. 20.—Council met in adjourned session.

A committee from the commercial club asked permission to use the vacant lot back of the city hall for hitching purposes. The request was granted.

Judges and clerks of election were appointed. The city hall, east side house and west side house were designated as polling places.

The council, having ascertained that the assessed valuation of the property within the city had been reduced \$139,920, found it necessary to have a higher rate of taxation to raise the same amount of money. After careful consideration, the following levy was decided upon.

General, 10 mills; sewer, 1 mill; library, 1/2 mill; street, 1/2 mill. Total, 12 mills.

This will produce a revenue for all purposes of \$14,947.18.

It was also determined that the city was run at less expense during the past year than was estimated and there will be over \$2,000 to apply on reducing the warrant indebtedness.

On motion the street committee was ordered to purchase a car of crushed rock from Springfield for repair of streets, it being cheaper to buy the rock from Springfield than to start up the crusher.

On motion the committee was ordered to have Sixth street repaired and rolled.

It was ordered that a public meeting be held Monday night, November 27, for the nomination of officers for the city election.
