COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Dec. 4, 1916.—Regular meeting. Roll called and all present except Alderman Walker.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. The vote of the annual city election was canvassed, showing the following results: For mayor—Smith 175, Wheeler 268; for treasurer—Eakin 368; for recorder—Young 367; for aldermen: first ward—Veatch 115; second ward—Walker 169; third ward—Garoutte 75; Richmond 45.

Motion prevailed that it is the sense of this council that the treasurer consolidate all street improvement funds into one fund to be known as the general street improvement fund.

On motion a warrant was ordered drawn on the street fund in favor of the Main street paving fund for \$15.75 to pay for city's street improvement on King property.

On motion it was ordered that a warrant be drawn in favor of The Cottage Grove Sentinel for \$2.35 in place of warrant No. 160 which had been lost, providing treasurer reports that same has not been paid.

On motion a warrant was ordered drawn on the library fund in favor of the library board for \$168.75, balance on hand.

On motion warrants were ordered drawn in favor of the mayor and councilmen for \$12 each as salaries for 1916; also that warrants of \$1.50 each be drawn in favor of the judges and clerks of election.

The street committee reported adversely on the bill of B. K. Lawson for digging ditch on Madison street. The report was accepted and the bill disallowed.

On motion the street commissioner was instructed to plank the ditch dug by B. K. Lawson in Madison street.

On motion the recorder was instructed to give written notice to the telephone company to move the pole which obstructs the fire hydrant at the corner of Tenth and Madison.

On motion the recorder was instructed to receive proposals for printing 150 copies of the city charter and amendments thereto.
