COUNTY INDEBTEDNESS CAN'T GO OVER \$5,000

Taxes in Process of Collection May, However, Be Used to Offset Warrants Outstanding.

Just what constitutes a debt of \$5000 for a county is likely to come before the courts for adjudication, for the "state-wide tax and indebtedness limitation amendment," adopted by the people at the November election, sets a new standard to be used in computing this department. Informal statements made to the county court that county warrants might not be salable, impelled that body to ask the district attorney for an opinion and he in turn referred the matter to the state's attorney. Assistant State's Attorney Van Winkle, writing the opinion, points out that both voluntary and involuntary debts of the county are to be counted in computing the total of the outstanding debt of the county. That taxes in the process of collection may be applied on the amount of warrants outstanding in computing whether or not there is a debt of \$5000, is the opinion of the attorney general's office.

Those buying county warrants hereafter will probably require from the treasurer a certificate that the indebtedness of the county at the time of issuance of the warrant, and including the warrant, was not over \$5000.
