SUTHERLIN PAPER BUILDS ELECTRIC ROAD TO C. G.

In commenting on the recent railroad rumors of the possibility of a railroad being built from near Sutherlin to Coos Bay, the Sutherlin Sun says:

"A gentleman who arrived in Sutherlin last Monday from Portland and Coos Bay points, informed the Sun that he had recently seen a map showing a proposed extension of the Oregon Electric line from Cottage Grove to London Springs, east of Sutherlin, where it would connect with the road now building by the Roach Timber company. He further stated that as soon as spring opened several surveying parties would be put in the field with a view of getting a lineup on a road from Sutherlin to tide-water as early as possible. He predicted that grading on this new road would be under way early the coming year.

"In the meantime work is being pushed along here on the Sutherlin, Coos Bay & Eastern railroad by the Roach Timber company, regardless of the fact that recent weather conditions have not been very favorable to the successful prosecution of the work. A large number of men and teams are employed, and some eight miles of the grading is now practically completed."

The installation will be held next Wednesday.

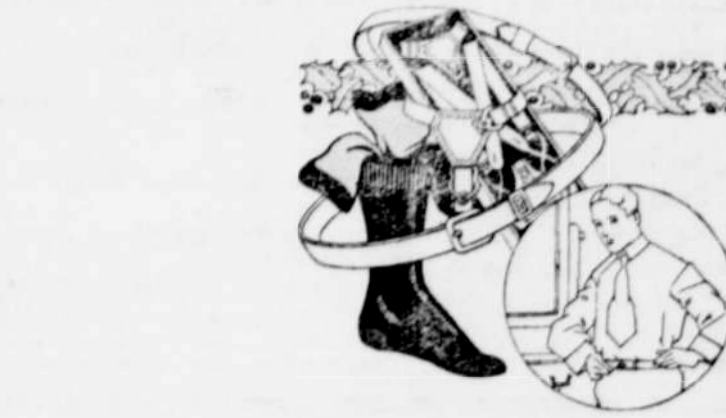
RESULTS OF RECENT RIFLE CONTEST GIVEN
