### FADS AND FANCIES

When washing white silk, allow one tablespoonful of alcohol to every two quarts of water. Wash in the usual way with white soap. Roll in Turkish towel for ten minutes, then iron. Silk washed in this way will keep pure white, and be like new every time it is laundered.

To clean sewer sink pipes take a teaspoonful of washing soda and a cup of vinegar, and when the soda is dissolved pour it down the sink. It will clean the most clogged pipes.

One of the best methods of cleaning painted woodwork is to use naphtha soap exactly as you would use it in washing clothes. Rub the woodwork over with a well-soaped cloth and let it stand a few minutes. This loosens the dirt as soaking the clothes loosens it in the laundry work, so that in going over the woodwork a second time all soil comes almost without rubbing. This method is not only quicker than scrubbing, but much better for the paint.

A teaspoonful of salt thrown into the water in which eggs are boiling will prevent the leakage from a cracked egg.

Boiled rice can be prevented from sticking to the saucepan merely by putting a teaspoonful of lemon juice diluted with a little cold water into the rice before pouring in the boiling water. This not only prevents the rice from sticking, but whitens it and adds a delightful flavor that is a great improvement on the rather flat taste of the unseasoned article.

This is interesting to know: It has been my experience that, when working about the stove or frying in hot fat, one often gets a painful burn. If one immediately puts vinegar on the burn, letting it dry in, it will take the fire out instantly and the burn will be gone. But it must be done immediately. One night last winter I was frying sausage, and in pouring the hot grease out of the frying pan in some way I poured it into the palm of my hand. I instantly drenched my hand in vinegar, letting it dry in, putting more on a second time. In ten minutes I could not find where the burn had been.

Always cook green vegetables in an uncovered kettle. This preserves their fresh, green color. In seasoning after they are drained be as liberal as possible with the butter. Two or three tablespoonfuls of thick cream added with the butter is still a greater improvement, and pepper and salt should be added to taste.

### TESTED RECIPES

**Buns**—One cup yeast, one cup sugar, three cups milk; stir to a thick batter. When raised, add one cup butter, one cup sugar, one teaspoon of soda; nutmeg and currants. Mix as for biscuit; stand until light. Let it rise again until after making into biscuit.

**Clams on Biscuit**—Two tablespoons of butter, one cup of clam juice, juice of half a lemon, one teaspoon of parsley, minced; two drops tobacco sauce; cook until boiling; add a dozen clams chopped fine; split open six shredded biscuit or Boston crackers dipped in hot water and spread with butter; pour the clams over. Serve on a hot dish.
