UNDER THE BIG DOME AT SALEM

My letter this week will be brief, but I hope to have some interesting things to say in later letters while representing the Oregon Editorial Association at the session.

Lane county is somewhat unfortunate this year. Senator Bingham did not return from New York and Senator Cusick (of Linn and Lane) who is attending to Senator Bingham's affairs, was late in getting into the organization and was not as well placed on committees as he otherwise might have been.

Senator Cusick, who is serving his second session, took some notes two years ago which have greatly aided him in his stand for an economical conduct of affairs. He has been one of the leaders in the fight against overloading committees with clerical help.

He is chairman of the banking committee, and is also a member of the committees on horticulture, on medicine, pharmacy and dentistry and on resolutions.

In the house, where Representative Bean was a candidate for speaker, Lane county has been poorly looked after in committee appointments. None secured a chairmanship.

Bean is a member of the cities and towns committee, on judiciary and on public institutions.

Eaton is on the committees on labor and industries and on salaries.

Jones is a member of the committees on corporations, on elections and on immigration.

Bean and Eaton are veteran members, Eaton being the dean of the house. Both will be heard from before the end of the session.

Jones, who is serving his first term, and is taking things as they come until he gets onto the ropes, but will probably introduce some interesting legislation before the session ends.

The question was open to all speakers.
